Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project

File No.: M21-210B2

Description: The Reservoir Upgrades Project has several components to increase the efficiency and reliability of Reservoirs 1 and 2: Chemical storage and feed systems (sodium hypochlorite and aqueous ammonia) to help reduce nitrification issues in the distribution system; Pump replacement and conversion of drivers from gas engines to electrical motors; Upgrades to reservoir electrical service through SCE; Installation of diesel generator systems to power the reservoirs in the event of an emergency; Miscellaneous system rehabilitation and upgrades including electrical gear replacement, pipeline rehabilitation, pipeline modifications, and instrument replacement based on the results of site visits and related analyses; and Slurry Dewatering Pit upgrades located at the Reservoir 1 site.

Status: Following the approval of the recommendations of the Water, Power, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment, Mesa Water developed a design Scope of Work for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project. A proposal was solicited from a CIPR on-call design consultant and the project's Preliminary and Final Design was kicked off in May 2021. The consultant delivered a draft version of Technical Memorandum No.1 – Reservoir 1 Site Master Plan and the draft Permit Plan in July 2021. Following Mesa Water's review of TM1 and the Permit Plan, the consultant began work on the Preliminary Design Report. The Preliminary Design Report was delivered in November 2021 and the Preliminary Design Report Workshop was held in September 2021. In March 2023, the Final Bid documents and cost estimate were received and reviewed by staff. After receiving approval for the project's reduced scope, the project team began modifying the Bid Documents. The revised Bid Documents were received in August 2023. Request for Bids were released to the prequalified contractors in August 2023. A job walk was conducted in August 2023 and attended by five prequalified contractors. The bid opening was held in October 2023. Four bids were received. A recommendation for contract time extension negotiation and award was approved November 2023. The contract time extension negotiation to accommodate equipment lead times was completed and Notice to Proceed was provided January 2024. A preconstruction meeting and a site walk with the contractor team were held February 2024. The construction team mobilized at Reservoir 2 in June 2024 and Reservoir 1 in October 2024. The contractor installed and started new mixers in Reservoir 2 in August 2024. At Reservoir 2, the contractor poured and coated the concrete foundation for the Reservoir chemical facility and constructed yard piping and electrical. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. Work is stopped due to the impacts of the contractor-installed pipeline

break at Reservoir 2 on October 18, 2025. The initial forensic site investigation was completed in November 2025. Testing and repair of the damaged equipment is in process. The Contractor's insurance representatives are scheduled to inspect the damage on January 21, 2026. The pumps and motors are expected in March 2026; however, the variable frequency drives were destroyed in the October 18, 2025 incident. At Reservoir 1, the contractor has demolished yard structures, excavated for the new Heavy Equipment Port, Slurry Dewatering Pit, Chemical Facility, and Generator Pads. The Slurry Dewatering Pit went into operation in April 2025. After a rain delay, concrete foundations for the Heavy Equipment Port and Chemical Facility were poured in March 2025. The structural steel for the Heavy Equipment Port was received in April 2025, and the building is currently under construction. The building panels were delivered in August 2025. The contractor is coordinating with Southern California Edison for working in the vicinity of its power lines. The Air Quality Management District Permits to Construct and Operate the diesel backup generators were received in March 2025. The generator concrete pads were poured in May 2025. The generators were set on the pads in June 2025. The chemical tanks were delivered in August 2025 and anchored to the chemical pads. The electrical subcontractor is running the electrical conduits. The electrical subcontractor is planning to pour the concrete pads for the main electrical switchgear and generator switchgear in March 2026. The main switchboard, pumps and motors are expected to be delivered in March 2026. Work in the Reservoir 1 Pump Station is delayed until Reservoir 2 and its Pump Station are back on line.

Capital Improvement Program Update

File No.: M24-104

Description: Develop a prioritized 10-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for water system improvements, including an updated supply and demand analysis, calibration of the hydraulic model, District-wide asset condition assessment, and development of a roadmap for Asset Management Program implementation.

Status: A contract was awarded to Carollo Engineers (Carollo) in May 2024. Technical Memo (TM) 1 Demands and TM 2 Supply were received in October 2024 and were reviewed by staff ahead of the Workshop on October 21, 2024. Revised TM 1 and TM 2 were received in January 2025. Staff provided pressure logger data and production data for the Hydraulic Model calibration in August 2024. Carollo's team performed asset condition assessment field work in August and September 2024. The Hydraulic Model TM was received in December 2024, and the workshop to review the TM was held on December 17, 2024. Staff

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provided additional data to the Carollo team to improve the hydraulic model calibration. A workshop to define the Asset Management Software Requirements was held in October 2024. Asset Management Software demonstrations were held in November and December 2024. TM 5 Regulatory Requirements was received in October 2024 and was reviewed by staff. A workshop to define the asset Consequence of Failure was held in January 2025. TM 3 Transmission Systems Evaluation was received in January 2025 and was reviewed by staff. TM 9 Condition Assessment was received in January 2025 and reviewed by staff. Draft TM 10 CIP was received in March 2025 and was reviewed by staff. The draft TM 7 Asset Management Roadmap was received in April 2025 and was reviewed by staff. A workshop to review TM7 Asset Management Roadmap was held in April 2025. The results were presented to the Board in January 2026. Staff plans to bring the CIP for adoption to the April 8, 2026 Board meeting.

Local groundwater Supply Improvement Project (Local SIP)

File No.: M24-105

Description: The Local SIP will develop a feasibility study that meets the requirements of the Bureau of Reclamation's (USBR) Feasibility Study Directives and Standards (WTR 11-01) for a brackish groundwater desalination facility. The project is being conducted in partnership and cost sharing with Orange County Water District, City of Huntington Beach and City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to Black & Veatch Corporation (Black & Veatch) in May 2024. The project team has completed the evaluation of aquifer zones and selected the Talbert Gap on which to focus the alternative analysis for the feasibility study. The project team has also completed modeling the potential wellfield locations, developing treatment plant footprints, the Class V level life-cycle cost for the project, and developing the preferred alternative. The Board approved a contract amendment to the Black & Veatch contract for Clean Energy Capital to perform a funding analysis. The draft Feasibility Study was received and a review workshop was held in August 2025. Preliminary comments were received from USBR in September 2025. The final Feasibility Study was submitted to USBR in September 2025. Staff received comments on the final Feasibility Study from USBR in January 2026 and is currently working to resolve comments. Mesa Water anticipates submitting the final revised Feasibility Study to USBR by the end of March 2026. In February 2026, staff received a proposal for next steps, including additional groundwater modeling refinement and subsidence evaluation. In February 2026, staff also met with USBR to discuss the Feasibility Study and next steps for the project

and funding opportunities. Staff is working with Black & Veatch to present the Local SIP at the March 25, 2026 Board meeting.

Interagency Water Transfers (Newport Beach)

File No.: M25-108

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to MKN & Associates (MKN). The draft feasibility study was received in July 2025 and a workshop to review was held in August 2025. MKN presented the results at the September 10, 2025 Board meeting. Staff is coordinating with MKN and the City of Newport Beach to design the connection. MKN submitted the 60% drawings in February 2026, which staff has provided comments on. The City of Costa Mesa issued an encroachment permit, and potholing activities were completed in February 2026. Final design will conclude in March 2026 and the encroachment permit process will commence with the City. Contracts for Engineering Support During Construction, Construction Management and Construction are expected to be executed by April 2026.

Interagency Water Transfers (Huntington Beach)

File No.: M25-101

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Huntington Beach.

Status: A Cooperative Agreement was executed with the City of Huntington Beach in October 2024. Staff received three proposals from qualified consultants in June 2025. The Board awarded a contract to MKN & Associates (MKN) in July 2025. Notice to Proceed was provided in August 2025. A kickoff meeting was held in September 2025, and supply and demand data was collected in October 2025 and as of November 2025, MKN delivered a draft Feasibility Study in December 2025, which has been reviewed by staff from Mesa Water and the City of Huntington Beach. Comments have been provided to the consultant, and MKN is incorporating revisions, including refinement of regulatory considerations and infrastructure assumptions. The project has been introduced to the Department of Drinking Water, and coordination with DDW is ongoing. In February 2026, staff received and provided comments on the Draft Final Feasibility Study and continued discussions with DDW. The Final

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Feasibility Study was received in March 2026 and presented to the Board at the March 11, 2026 Board meeting.

Pipeline Integrity Program

File No.: M25-103

Description: Implement Resolution No. 1525 Replacement of Assets.

Status: Since its inception in 2015, the Pipeline Integrity Program has been implemented by staff to use pipeline condition, rather than pipeline age, to prioritize pipeline replacements. The current and previous fiscal year's progress is described in this report. In Fiscal Year (FY) 2024, the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant reviewed mainline break data from FY 2022 and FY 2023 and recommended condition assessment for pipeline groups with break thresholds that exceed the standards of Resolution No. 1525. These recommendations were presented to the Board in September 2023. Based on the recommendations, staff negotiated a proposal for ePulse condition assessment of 2.2 miles of AC pipe. The field work was completed in May 2024 and the report was received in July 2024. The results of the condition assessment were reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. The consultant's report was received in October 2024 and reviewed by staff. No AC pipelines were recommended in the report. Additionally, Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC) staff performed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May and June 2024. The final leak detection report was received in June 2024 and no mainline leaks were reported. Staff evaluated the feasibility of a condition assessment technology for small diameter metal pipelines, and has requested a proposal from a vendor. The contract for small diameter pipeline condition assessment was approved at the March 12, 2025 Board meeting. The condition assessment was attempted on June 16-17, 2025 but was not successful. Staff sent ten AC pipe samples collected in conjunction with routine work for wall thickness measurement in February 2025. The wall thickness measurements were received in April 2025 and were reviewed by staff and the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. No immediate pipeline replacements were suggested by the data. The Consultant's report was received in June 2025 and was reviewed by staff. MWDOC completed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May 2025. No mainline leaks were found. Permanent pressure transient monitoring at the pump stations and other strategic locations was installed in June 2025. Staff is evaluating several AI models to predict mainline breaks and prioritize pipeline replacement. A contract was awarded to HDR to continue as the Pipeline Integrity Program consultant for FY 2026. A kickoff meeting for FY 2026 work was held in September 2025. An update to the Board was presented in October 2025. An

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updated Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the January 28, 2026 Board meeting and the Board's comments were incorporated. The revised Replacement of Assets resolution was brought to the February 11, 2026 Board meeting. Sixteen AC pipe samples collected as part of break repairs and valve and hydrant replacements were sent to the lab for wall thickness testing on February 24, 2026. Wall thickness results are expected in May 2026.

SCADA Needs Assessment

File No.: M26-100

Description: Assess Mesa Water's current Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition system, compile a comprehensive asset list, and define a path forward for modernization and future system improvements.

Status: Staff developed a draft Scope of Work and incorporated feedback from expert consultants. The Request for Proposal was posted in October 2025 and six proposals were received in November 2025. An information item was provided at the December 2025 Board meeting. A contract was awarded to West Yost at the January 14, 2026 Board meeting. The contract was executed in February 2026 and the kickoff occurred in March 2026. In March 2026, West Yost is gathering SCADA related documentation and preparing for staff interviews and site visits.

Mesa Water Education Center Flagpole

File No.: M25-104

Description: Evaluate the most appropriate location and height of the flagpole at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility and then execute the construction of the selected flagpole.

Status: Staff received a draft report regarding the installation of a flagpole at the Mesa Water Education Center in December 2024. Staff reviewed the draft report and presented recommendations at the April 23, 2025 Board meeting. A design proposal was received in November 2025.

Mesa Water Reliability Facility Electric Vehicle Charging Station

File No.: M25-105

Description: Conduct a feasibility study and preliminary cost estimate of constructing electric vehicle (EV) charging stations at the Mesa Water Reliability Facility (MWRF).

MESA WATER AND OTHER AGENCY PROJECTS STATUS REPORT

March 2026

Status: Mesa Energy Systems submitted a proposal for a feasibility study in January 2026. A kickoff meeting and site visit was held in March 2026. The draft feasibility study is expected to be submitted in April 2026.

Well Nos. 12 and 14 Power Quality Mitigation

File No.: M26-200

Description: Evaluate and implement solutions to mitigate power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. The project includes installation of power quality monitoring equipment and evaluation of technologies such as flywheel uninterruptible power supply (UPS) systems and battery energy storage systems (BESS) to maintain well operations during voltage dips, outages and Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) events.

Status: In late 2025, staff began evaluating mitigation strategies for increasing power quality disturbances affecting Well Nos. 12 and 14. In December 2025, applications were submitted to the Self-Generation Incentive Program (SGIP) through Southern California Edison and Southern California Gas Company for battery energy storage systems at both well sites. Battery feasibility analysis is currently underway to evaluate system sizing, resilience benefits and long-term financial performance. The results of this analysis will be incorporated into a broader backup power technology evaluation. In March 2026, staff received a proposal from Lee + Ro to evaluate backup power technologies for Well Nos. 12 and 14, including flywheel UPS systems, battery energy storage systems, and hybrid solutions. Power quality monitoring has been installed at both well sites, and the collected data will be used to inform the feasibility analysis and technology evaluation.

Outcome: Staff observed that the water entering the apartment and the water from the interior faucet were both clear and had normal chlorine residual levels. A tar-like black residue was observed in the toilet bowl; however, the water in the toilet tank was clear. Staff informed the customer that this indicated that the residue appeared to be isolated to the toilet and was not related to the water supply. Staff assured the customer that Mesa Water District's water meets all applicable state and federal drinking water standards.

Description: The customer reported a "rotten egg/sewer-like odor" coming from multiple bathroom sinks.

Based on these findings, the issue appears to be internal and likely originating from the customer's drains. Staff assured the customer that Mesa Water District's water meets all applicable state and federal drinking water standards.

- Strengthening Mesa Water’s industry relations to provide opportunities for improving the District’s business and operations -- including the areas of financial and human resources strength, infrastructure and technological innovation, and setting/supporting policies that have a positive impact on Mesa Water’s service area -- so that the District can continue to provide safe, high-quality, reliable, and affordable water to its customers.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

At its November 8, 2023 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) awarded a contract to Pacific Hydrotech Corporation for \$14,764,900 and a 10% contingency of \$1,476,490 for a total amount not to exceed \$16,241,390 for the construction of the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project, directed staff to negotiate a contract end date, and authorized execution of the contract.

At its November 8, 2023 meeting, the Board also approved a sole source contract to Hazen and Sawyer for \$204,655 and a 10% contingency of \$20,465 for a total amount not to exceed \$225,120 to provide Engineering Services During Construction for the Reservoirs 1 & 2 Upgrades Project, and authorized execution of the contract.

At its July 10, 2024 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Lee + Ro, Inc. for \$271,500 and a 10% contingency of \$27,150 for a total amount not to exceed \$298,650 to provide Engineering Services During Construction for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project, and authorized execution of the contract.

At its June 25, 2025 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Black & Veatch Corporation for an



amount not to exceed \$552,359 to provide Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project, and authorized execution of the contract.

At its February 25, 2026 meeting, the Board received an Information Item regarding the Reservoir 2 Pump Station Recovery.

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) delivers abundant, local, reliable and safe potable water to its ratepayers using nine groundwater wells and two storage reservoirs, each with a pump station. Constant pressure in the distribution system is supplied by the groundwater well pumps, with the reservoirs and associated pump stations serving to balance flow and pressure with demand. The reservoirs also provide a total of 28 million gallons of storage that can be used during peak demands, maintenance events or firefighting. However, water quality issues have limited the amount of water that can be reliably stored. Additionally, the current reservoir pump stations utilize natural gas engines to drive the main pumps and electric motors for the smaller jockey pumps that manage low flow requirements. These gas engines are near the end of their useful life and require replacement. In 2020, a Water Supply, Energy and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment was completed which recommended replacing the gas engines with electric motors and diesel generator back-up power. The recommendation was based on the standardization of pump drive and backup technologies with the clear wells.

The purpose of the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project is to improve overall system reliability and streamline operations and maintenance. The following components were included in the scope of work for the project:

- Replacement of natural gas engine driven pumps with electric motor driven pumps at Reservoir 1
- Replacement of propane backup systems with standby diesel generators at Reservoir 1
- Demolition of hydro turbines at Reservoir 1
- Comprehensive rehabilitation of pumping systems piping, valves and instrumentation at Reservoir 1
- Replacement of electrical gear to support new electrical systems at Reservoir 1
- Upgrade of Southern California Edison (SCE) services for both reservoir sites
- Upgrade of selected structures and maintenance facilities
- Replacement of existing slurry dewatering pit at Reservoir 1
- Addition of two new electric motor driven jockey pumps at Reservoir 2
- Incorporation of new chemical facilities at both reservoirs

DISCUSSION

As its March 11, 2026 meeting, the Board directed staff to agendize the following recommendations for the March 25, 2026 Board meeting Consent Calendar:

- a. Amend the Maintenance Agreement with Emissions Compliance Controls Company for an additional \$150,000 per year for Fiscal Years 2026 and 2027 for a total contract amount



not to exceed \$200,000 per year to provide an overhaul of Reservoir 2 Engine 2, and authorize execution of the amendment;

- b. Amend the Professional Services Agreement with Black & Veatch Corporation for an additional \$948,800 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$1,501,159 to continue to provide Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Reservoirs 1 & 2 Upgrades Project and the Reservoir 2 Pump Station Recovery, and authorize execution of the amendment;
- c. Amend the Professional Services Agreement with Hazen and Sawyer, Inc. for an additional \$29,515 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$254,635 to provide plans and specifications for the contractor to rebuild the failed motive water line, and authorize execution of the amendment; and
- d. Authorize the General Manager to execute additional contracts and change orders in the aggregate of \$500,000 for the Reservoir 2 Pump Station Recovery efforts.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$138,000 was approved via two contracts with Emissions Compliance Controls Company to provide gas engine and right angle gear drive maintenance; \$35,437 has been spent to date.

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$552,359 was approved for Black & Veatch to provide Construction Management and Inspection for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project through March 2026; \$232,965 has been spent to date.

\$19,500,000 is budgeted for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project; \$11,430,000 has been spent to date.

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) is preparing to launch SpryCIS, the District's new cloud-based Customer Information System (CIS) provided by SpryPoint Services, Inc. This June 2026 implementation replaces the legacy Cogsdale system (integrated with Invoice Cloud) and introduces MyMesaWater, a modern, secure online customer portal.

The transition will deliver enhanced self-service capabilities, streamlined processes and improved customer engagement while maintaining continuity for existing users. A comprehensive, multi-channel outreach plan has been developed to ensure customers are informed, supported and experience minimal disruption. The SpryCIS project directly fulfills a key objective in Mesa Water's Fiscal Year 2026 Strategic Plan and aligns with the District's commitment to excellence in customer service, financial responsibility and infrastructure modernization.

DISCUSSION

Anticipated Customer Changes and Impacts

Mesa Water customers can expect the following updates upon launch of SpryCIS and MyMesaWater:

- A new, modern online portal requiring re-registration for online payments and account access (existing Invoice Cloud customers may continue using their current login credentials).
- Updated bill statement design for improved readability and clarity.
- Payment history and information now fully accessible within the MyMesaWater portal.



- Single login credentials to view and manage all accounts (residential, commercial or multiple properties).
- Replacement of Invoice Cloud with MyMesaWater as the primary billing and payment platform.
- Issuance of new account numbers; however, existing customers will not need to enter an account number to log in to the portal.
- Optional opt-in for Mesa Water newsletter and event updates via the portal.
- New self-service online wizard for requesting Move-In/Move-Out service orders.
- Requirement of a valid email address and phone number for online Move-In requests (for verification and confirmation purposes).

These changes are designed to be intuitive and user-friendly, with robust support available to assist any customer questions.

Benefits of the New SpryCIS System

SpryCIS represents a significant upgrade from the District's 25-year-old legacy platform. Key customer benefits include:

- **Enhanced Convenience and Accessibility:** A modern, mobile-responsive portal with single-sign-on functionality eliminates the need to manage multiple logins. Customers can view bills, make payments and manage accounts 24/7 from any device.
- **Improved Self-Service Options:** The new Move-In/Move-Out wizard allows customers to complete service requests instantly without calling or visiting the office, reducing wait times and paperwork.
- **Clearer Communication and Engagement:** Updated bill formats are easier to understand, and optional newsletter/event opt-ins keep customers informed and engaged with community service messaging.
- **Seamless Transition and Continuity:** Existing Invoice Cloud users retain their login credentials; new account numbers are issued behind the scenes and do not impact portal access. Payment history migrates automatically.
- **Overall Experience:** Faster response times, real-time updates and integrated tools result in higher satisfaction and empower customers to manage their water service more efficiently.

These improvements directly respond to evolving customer expectations for digital-first service while maintaining the high standards of reliability and transparency Mesa Water has always provided.



The SpryCIS project is explicitly identified in Mesa Water's Fiscal Year 2026 Strategic Plan as a sub-objective under Strategic Goal #6: Provide excellent customer service (Objective B – Enhance the customer experience: Implement a new Customer Information System by October 2026). The project further supports:

- Strategic Goal #2: Perpetually renew and improve our infrastructure (Objective D – Improve information technology infrastructure assets to assure reliability and security). The cloud-based SaaS solution eliminates outdated on-premises hardware and enables continuous feature enhancements.
- Strategic Goal #3: Be financially responsible and transparent through cost-effective subscription licensing, reduced maintenance expenses and streamlined operations that support competitive rates.
- Strategic Goal #6: Provide excellent customer service through improving the customer's experience with ease.
- Strategic Goal #8: Practice continual business improvement via modern integrations, mobile field solutions and data-driven reporting.

By modernizing the District's customer-facing systems, SpryCIS advances Mesa Water's vision "To Be a Top Performing Public Water Agency" and reinforces its mission to reliably provide clean, safe water while delivering outstanding service and financial stewardship.

Outreach Plan

To promote a smooth rollout and maximize adoption of the new features, Mesa Water will execute a proactive, multi-phase outreach campaign beginning immediately and continuing through the first 90 days post-launch. The plan emphasizes clear, consistent messaging focused on "what's changing," "what remains the same," and "how to benefit." Key elements include:

- Digital Notifications: Email blasts to all registered Invoice Cloud and MyMesaWater users (approximately 4–6 weeks prior to launch), website banner on MesaWater.org, and a dedicated SpryCIS/MyMesaWater FAQ page with step-by-step guides.
- Bill Inserts and Direct Mail: Bill inserts will be distributed leading up to the launch and afterwards to encourage sign ups. Inserts will include new portal access instructions, and new account number information. A mailer will be sent two weeks ahead of launch.
- Social Media: Targeted posts on Mesa Water's Facebook and Instagram pages.
- Customer Service Support: Dedicated transition hotline (949-631-1200, option 2) and live chat during business hours; all front-line staff trained on the new system with scripts for common questions. In-person assistance available at District Headquarters by appointment.



- Post-Launch Follow-Up: Automated welcome emails to new registrants, opt-in prompts for the Mesa Water newsletter, and a customer satisfaction survey at 30 and 90 days to measure success against Mesa Water's Elite Customer Service Standards.
- Partnerships: Collaboration with local apartment complexes and property managers for Move-In/Move-Out wizard promotion.

The goal is less than a 5% call-volume spike during the transition period.

Next Steps

The launch of SpryCIS and MyMesaWater marks an important milestone in Mesa Water's commitment to customer-centric innovation. With a robust outreach plan in place and clear benefits for Mesa Water's customers, the transition is planned to be seamless and well-received.

Staff will provide a post-launch status report at a July 2026 Board meeting, including adoption metrics, customer feedback and any recommended adjustments.

BACKGROUND

Purpose

This project is the integration of the SpryPoint CIS (SpryCIS) platform with the NICE CXone phone system. This initiative is a key component of Mesa Water District's (Mesa Water®) ongoing SpryCIS implementation and will enhance customer service operations by enabling automated screen pops of customer account information during inbound calls.

This technical improvement empowers the District's customer service representatives to deliver timely, accurate and responsive support, aligning with objectives to enhance customer interactions and satisfaction. By adopting advanced technology to automate processes, this project fosters ongoing enhancements in operational efficiency and service delivery. The alignment with Mesa Water's strategic plan ensures the project contributes to the District's vision of being a top-performing water agency.

Project Overview

Mesa Water is implementing the SpryCIS platform to modernize its customer information system. The proposed integration will leverage the SpryCIS read-only account lookup API to automatically display relevant customer data in NICE CXone when calls are received. T2 Tech will handle the design, configuration, testing and deployment of this screen pop functionality. This will allow customer service representatives to access account details seamlessly based on the caller's phone number, improving response times and accuracy without requiring customizations to the Customer Information System (CIS) or extensive changes to existing CXone licensing.



DISCUSSION

Summary of Scope of Work

The project's Scope of Work is structured into five phases:

1. **Solution Design:** Includes kickoff meetings, reviews of CXone scripts, application programming interface validation and defining workflows, with deliverables such as a project summary, approved design and implementation schedule.
2. **Development & Configuration:** Involves creating/modifying CXone scripts, configuring dynamic URLs and preparing environments, delivering configured scripts, functional workflows and initial documentation.
3. **Stage Integration & Validation:** Deploys to staging, tests various match scenarios and tunes performance, providing validated integration, test results and User Acceptance Testing (UAT) readiness.
4. **User Acceptance Testing & Training:** Supports UAT, makes adjustments and delivers up to two training sessions, with completed validations, training materials and sessions.
5. **Production Deployment & Cutover:** Handles go-live planning, promotions to production, validation and one week of stabilization support, ensuring operational functionality.

Staff recommends the Board approve a contract with T2 Tech for \$22,305 to provide technical implementation services for the integration between SpryCIS and the NICE CXone phone system to enable automated screen pops of customer account information during inbound calls. This project represents a strategic investment in Mesa Water's customer service capabilities, with an estimated timeline aligned to the SpryCIS rollout.

Purpose

This project is the integration and implementation of the Anna AI platform with the NICE CXone phone system. This enhancement will automate the call review and performance scoring process for the customer service representatives, provide call performance information that will drive the individual training and coaching plans, and identify and measure emotions that are expressed by Mesa Water's customers and customer service representatives during a phone conversation. This project will enhance our customer experience capabilities through AI-driven tools and integrate the system with our Information Technology (IT) infrastructure to ensure secure and efficient operations.

Anna AI Capabilities

The Anna AI add-on for NICE CXone leverages advanced AI technologies to provide robust features in reporting, coaching and sentiment. In reporting, the add-on generates AI-derived insights, visualizations and charts from customer interactions, enabling data-driven decision-making to identify trends, improve issue resolution and optimize contact center performance. For coaching, it offers personalized, automated recommendations based on interaction analysis, helping supervisors create targeted development plans that boost agent skills, recognition programs and overall team effectiveness. In sentiment analysis, the add-on provides real-time monitoring of customer and agent emotions across channels, detecting positive or negative sentiments to facilitate immediate interventions, and enhancing customer satisfaction. These capabilities automate quality management processes, streamline workflows and drive better outcomes for both customers and employees.



DISCUSSION

The project's initiative advances Mesa Water's mission by leveraging technology to deliver reliable, customer-focused services while ensuring operational excellence and risk mitigation.

Scope of Work

At its February 8, 2018 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) awarded a contract to Butier Engineering, Inc. for \$972,480 and a 10% contingency for a contract amount not to exceed \$1,069,728 to provide professional Construction Management Services for the Chandler & Croddy Wells and Pipeline Project.

At its August 13, 2020 meeting, the Board approved on-call professional construction management and inspection services contracts for the Capital Improvement Program Renewal in the amounts of \$1.1MM for Fiscal Year 2021, \$1.6MM for Fiscal Year 2022, and \$1.1MM for Fiscal Year 2023, with the option for two annual renewals of \$500,000 per year, for a total contract authorization amount not to exceed \$4.8MM to be distributed to the following five firms: Black and Veatch, Butier Engineering, Inc., CDM Smith, Inc., Michael Baker International and MWH Constructors.

At its February 11, 2021 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to Gateway Pacific Contractors, Inc. for \$12,975,000 and a 10% contingency of \$1,297,500 for a contract amount not to exceed \$14,272,500 for the equipping of Chandler Well No. 12 and Croddy Well No. 14, and authorized execution of the contract.

At its December 11, 2024 meeting, the Board approved a contract amendment to Butier Engineering, Inc.'s On-Call Professional Construction Management and Inspection Services for an amount not to exceed \$150,000 for continued Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Chandler & Croddy Wells and Pipeline Project.

BACKGROUND

In 2014, Mesa Water District's (Mesa Water's) Board set a goal to provide 115% of water demands from local, reliable water supplies. To achieve this goal, Mesa Water purchased two properties outside the service area in the City of Santa Ana (City) in 2017 with the intention to drill two new wells. Croddy Well No. 14 came online in May 2023 and Chandler Well No. 12 came online in April



2024. The pipeline to connect Chandler Well No. 12 and Croddy Well No. 14 to the Mesa Water distribution system is complete and operational. Since completion, Chandler Well No. 12 and Croddy Well No. 14 have been contributing 4,000 gallons per minute each to meet demands. These two new facilities have improved Mesa Water's local reliability and helped achieve the goal of providing 115% of water demands from local, reliable water supplies.

DISCUSSION

In 2018, Mesa Water executed a contract with Butier Engineering, Inc. (Butier) for construction management services for the Chandler & Croddy Wells and Pipeline Project (Project). Due to delays in the construction of the Project, Butier's efforts were extended under their Capital Improvement Program Renewal (CIPR) On-Call Construction Management Contract. While the Project was substantially completed in April 2024, the final closeout of the project has required additional services from the construction management team. Staff recommends approval of an amendment to Butier's contract for an amount not to exceed \$55,000 to provide additional construction management and inspection services.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, no funds are budgeted for Construction Management and Inspection Services for the Chandler & Croddy Wells and Pipeline Project; the requested funds will come from Cash on Hand.

BACKGROUND

The Political Reform Act of 1974 requires certain public officials to file a Statement of Economic Interests (Form 700) to disclose financial interests that could potentially create conflicts in the performance of their public duties.

Historically, Mesa Water District's (Mesa Water®) elected public officials, General Manager and General Legal Counsel (Legal Counsel) have completed and e-filed Form 700 statements pursuant to the District's Conflict of Interest Code, with the Orange County Board of Supervisors serving as the reviewing body for these filings.

In 2025, the California Legislature adopted Senate Bill (SB) 852, which amended California Government Code Section 87500 to expand the list of officials required to file Form 700 directly with the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC). The legislation added "public officials who



manage public investments” as a category of statutory filers required to electronically file their Form 700 statements directly with the FPPC.

Under FPPC regulations, “public officials who manage public investments” include high-level officers or employees who exercise primary responsibility for the management of public investments, such as a chief financial officer or principal investment officer, including individuals who direct investment of public funds, formulate or approve investment policies, or approve investment transactions.

DISCUSSION

Legal Counsel has reviewed Mesa Water’s structure and investment delegation and concluded that the District’s Chief Financial Officer (CFO) likely meets the definition under the amended statute of a “public official who manages public investments.”

Mesa Water annually adopts a delegation of investment authority resolution designating the CFO as the principal investment officer responsible for managing the District’s investments. Based on this designation and the responsibilities associated with the role, Legal Counsel has advised that the CFO should file Form 700 electronically with the FPPC as a statutory filer under SB 852. Accordingly, staff recommends the Board direct Mesa Water’s Filing Officer (Board Secretary) to coordinate with the CFO to annually e-file his Form 700 with the FPPC.

The application of SB 852 to members of the Board of Directors (Board) is less clear. While the Board does not make day-to-day investment decisions, it does adopt the District’s investment policy, receive periodic investment reports, and provide fiscal oversight. Legal Counsel noted that the statutory language and legislative history provide limited guidance as to whether members of a governing board that adopts investment policy would be considered “public officials who manage public investments.”

Legal Counsel also referenced a non-binding court decision involving a water district board in which a court interpreted similar statutory language and determined that a governing board responsible for establishing investment policy could fall within the definition of officials managing public investments. However, the decision is unpublished and does not establish binding precedent.

Because of this uncertainty, Legal Counsel suggested that the conservative approach would be for Board members to file Form 700 electronically with the FPPC until clearer guidance becomes available.

Legal Counsel also advised that Mesa Water may request a formal advice letter from the FPPC to obtain a definitive determination regarding whether Board members fall within the statutory definition.



Based on Legal Counsel's analysis, the Board may consider the following options:

Option 1 – Seek Formal Advice from the FPPC

Direct staff to submit a request for a formal advice letter from the FPPC to determine whether members of the Board are considered "public officials who manage public investments" under SB 852.

Option 2 – Take a Conservative Compliance Approach

Direct Board members to begin filing Form 700 statements electronically with the FPPC, in addition to existing filings, until further guidance is issued by the FPPC or Legislature.

Option 3 – Maintain the Current Filing Structure

Maintain the current filing structure for Board members to continue e-filing with the Orange County Board of Supervisors until additional guidance or regulatory clarification is provided.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) has been using the work planning module of MaintStar's Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS) since 2008. The work planning module allows Mesa Water the ability to generate work plans, schedule work and run management reports for operational improvement. The management reports allow Mesa Water to compare actual performance to an established work plan, including unit cost, productivity measurements, work accomplishment and resource utilization. This functionality is tied directly to the Annual Performance Audits under Work Performance, Results from the Key Performance Indicators for the Fiscal Year. The work planning module allows the managers and supervisors to manage the operation of the District and achieve results while focusing on efficiencies.

DISCUSSION

Mesa Water has engaged with LA Consulting, Inc. (LAC) since 2013, collaborating on evaluating and optimizing the District's business processes and resources, while reducing overall operational costs.

The current proposed engagement with LAC is structured into four primary tasks designed to update our work plans and continue with Mesa Water's operational efficiency:

Task 1: Activity & Guideline Validation

LAC will conduct departmental meetings to review and update the current "employee-equipment-method" mix. This ensures that MaintStar data reflects the actual work performed in the field.

- Key Deliverables: Updated asset inventories and modified activity definitions for all departments.



Task 2: Annual Facilitated Work Plan Updates

This task involves a comprehensive review of work frequencies against historical performance. LAC will assist staff in translating these insights into a data-driven annual work program.

- Key Deliverables: A finalized monthly schedule in the MaintStar CMMS that balances planned work units against available labor, equipment and material costs.

Task 3: Work Data Quality Control

Before finalization, LAC will perform a rigorous audit of the updated guidelines and work plans. This step ensures that the proposed plan is feasible within any limitations and resource availability.

Task 4: General CMMS Process Support

Ongoing technical support will be provided to District staff throughout the year. This includes assistance with scheduling procedures and the interpretation of monthly status reports to ensure the system remains a functional tool for decision-making.

Associated Benefits

By approving this scope of work, Mesa Water will realize the following benefits:

- Operational Efficiency: Synchronizes the MaintStar CMMS with real-world field conditions, reducing the gap between planned and actual maintenance.
- Resource Optimization: Prevents over-scheduling or under-utilization of labor and equipment by establishing a balanced monthly work program.
- Financial Accountability: Provides a clear estimate of labor and material costs per activity, allowing for more accurate budgeting and cost-tracking.

Staff recommends the Board approve a contract with LAC to ensure the continued integrity and effectiveness of the District's CMMS by conducting the facilitation of the Fiscal Year 2027 Work Plan Updates and the oversight of the Work Data Quality Control Services.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$426,500 is budgeted for Support Services; \$251,990 has been spent to date







Federal Government Update

On February 3rd, the remaining FY2026 appropriations bills were signed into law, with the exception of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) bill. As of March 16th, the DHS bill remains unresolved, and Democrats are stating they are not close to reaching a deal. Although an estimated 90% of employees across all DHS agencies are still working, the White House and Congress are trying to find an agreement soon as some DHS employees are continuing to work with either a partial paycheck or no compensation at all.

On February 25th, the Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Representative Tom Cole (R-OK), released Programmatic, Language, and Community Project Funding (CPF) Guidance for the FY2027 Appropriations process. The committee deadlines for requests are March 13th for those falling under the Agriculture, Commerce, Finance, Legislative Branch, Military Construction, and National Security subcommittees and March 20th for the Energy and Water, Defense, Homeland Security, Interior, Health and Human Services, and Transportation and Housing and Urban Development subcommittees. In the past, Representatives were limited to submitting 15 CPF requests, but this year that number was increased to 20 requests. VSA on behalf of Mesa Water District has submitted funding requests through its Congressional delegation for consideration in FY2027 for the Mainline Valves Replacement Project – Phase 2 and the Cybersecurity Project.

EPA Adds PFAS Chemical to Toxics Release Inventory

On February 27th, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) [added sodium perfluorohexanesulfonate \(PFHxS-Na\), a PFAS chemical, to the Toxics Release Inventory \(TRI\)](#), a tool that tracks and shares information about chemical releases and pollution prevention activities by factories and other facilities. This rule will require all relevant businesses to track and report any use or release of PFHxS-Na, with the first reports due by July 1st, 2027. Often entering water from firefighting foam, PFHxS-Na has been found to alter liver enzymes and result in liver damage, affect the liver and immune system of children, and decrease the immune response to vaccines.

ASA (CW) Issues “Building Infrastructure, Not Paperwork” Initiative

On February 23rd, Assistant Secretary of the Army (Civil Works), Adam Telle, released a “transformational plan” consisting of 27 “change initiatives” to maximize the ability to deliver national infrastructure, cut red tape, focus on efficiency, and increase transparency and

accountability. The document stated, “This transformation plan will provide a greater focus on our core missions that serve the national interest, strategically prioritizing all resources and directing funding to priority water resources projects while minimizing non-core programs.” In a House Transportation and Infrastructure hearing just days after the release of the plan, Telle explained the initiative will speed up projects and allocation of funds by empowering commanders and giving them more authority.

House T&I and Senate EPW Holding Hearings to Discuss WRDA 2026

On February 24th and 25th the [House Transportation and Infrastructure \(T&I\) Committee](#) and [Senate Environment and Public Works \(EPW\) Committee](#), held hearings to discuss the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) of 2026. WRDA is a biennial piece of legislation used to authorize the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) to plan, study, and construct water infrastructure projects with a focus on navigation, flood control, and aquatic ecosystem restoration. This legislation does not provide funding for the projects but instead directs USACE to provide their support.

With U.S. Army (Civil Works) Assistant Secretary Adam Telle and USACE Lieutenant General William Graham Jr. as witnesses, Senators and Representatives used the hearings to discuss their concerns with the WRDA process and activities of USACE. The most common themes included discussions surrounding goals of the recent USACE initiative to “Building Infrastructure, Not Paperwork”, the current USACE backlog of USACE projects over an estimated \$100 billion, the nearly 2,400 project authorization requests received in the House for WRDA 2026, increasing permit approval speed by giving district engineers more authority, engaging engineers from the beginning of project planning to ensure more accurate cost estimates, and concerns surrounding specific projects in their States and Districts not moving forward within the initially established timeline and a lack of communication from USACE.

EPA Launches Real Water Technical Assistance Initiative

On March 4th, 2026, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) launched the [Real Water Technical Assistance \(RealWaterTA\) initiative](#), a “back-to-basics approach to support drinking water and wastewater systems using proven, best-practice approaches that will most effectively address local needs while partnering with states and Tribes.” The initiative rescinds the Water Technical Assistance memorandum from March 24th, 2023, with the intention of updating spending policies and creating quantifiable impacts to be measured when assessing success. The new memorandum has a goal of assisting water systems to reliably provide safe drinking water and effectively treat wastewater over the long term, emphasizing support for small, rural, and tribal water systems. The initiative outlines the following eight priorities for EPA regions and technical assistance providers: support returning to and maintaining compliance; focus on traditional and innovative water infrastructure; define the scope of technical assistance; strengthen technical, managerial, and financial management; empower the water workforce; improve financial readiness and access to financial assistance; reduce inefficient costs; and drive real world results.

EPA Issues Alert Directing Utilities to Improve Cybersecurity Amid Tensions in the Middle East

On March 3rd, the EPA issued an [alert](#) encouraging U.S. water utilities “to take deliberate and meaningful steps to strengthen cybersecurity in light of activities in the middle east and the potential for U.S. critical infrastructure to be targeted.” The agency is directing utilities to report suspicious activity to the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The alert suggests that utilities follow recommendations in the Top Cyber Actions for Securing Water Systems Fact Sheet, reduce operational technology exposure to the public-facing internet, implement multifactor authentication for remote access to operational technology devices, and replace all default passwords on operational technology devices with strong, unique passwords.

Democrats Push Back on EPA’s Repeal of Greenhouse Gas Endangerment Finding

On February 13th, following the EPA’s decision to overturn the greenhouse gas endangerment finding, 41 Democrats, led by the Ranking Member of the Senate Committee of Environment and Public Works, Senator Sheldon Whitehouse (D-RI), have written a [letter](#) alleging EPA Administrator Lee Zeldin had decided to repeal the endangerment finding even before the public comment period or impact assessments were completed. California Senators Adam Schiff and Alex Padilla have signed the letter as well. The letter states “the timing of and context for this entire enterprise suggest that this was a predetermined outcome, perhaps dictated more by concern for corporate interests than by an honest review of the law and science of climate change.” The Senators end the letter with four requests, directing Zeldin to release all materials relevant to the decision-making process of repealing the endangerment finding, communications between EPA leadership and representatives of relevant industries and organizations, communications outlining how regulated entities rely on the endangerment finding, and communications between the EPA, Whitehouse, and other federal agencies relevant to their decision-making process.

WaterSMART Funding Opportunities Announced by Bureau of Reclamation

On March 5th, the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) announced the release of three WaterSMART funding opportunities, with a fourth announced on March 12th. BOR estimates a total of \$153.5 million will be available under the following grant opportunities: the [Small-Scale Water Efficiency Projects](#), with applications due June 2nd, 2026, will fund projects that conserve water and enhance water supply reliability in water delivery systems; the [Applied Science Grants](#), with applications due July 8th, 2026, will provide funding to non-Federal entities for the development of tools and information to support water management; the [Drought Response Program](#), with applications due July 28th, 2026, will fund projects designed to increase water management flexibility and reliability, helping entities prepare for and address impacts of drought and water supply shortages; and the [Large-Scale Water Recycling Projects](#), with applications due by May 13th, 2026, will fund water recycling projects that have a minimum cost of \$500 million.

NDWAC Seeking Nominations for Member Vacancies

On March 9th, the EPA Office of Ground Water and Drinking Water [announced](#) they are seeking nominations for the National Drinking Water Advisory Council (NDWAC) to fill vacancies with three year appointments. The Council was established by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA) to

provide independent advice, consultation, and recommendations to the EPA Administrator on matters relating to activities, functions, policies, and regulations under the SDWA. The agency is seeking nominees who are from the general public; appropriate state and local agencies concerned with water hygiene and public water supply; and representatives of private organizations or groups demonstrating an active interest in the field of water hygiene and public water supply, including nominees associated with small, rural public water systems.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to make permanent the Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP). This bill will allow HHS to award grants to eligible entities to provide funds to public water systems to assist low-income households in paying for drinking water or wastewater services.

Water Infrastructure Modernization Act (WIMA) ([S.2388](#), [H.R.6075](#)) Sen. Ruben Gallego (D-AZ), Rep. Robert Bresnahan (R-PA)

Status: Senate - 07/23/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Wastewater Infrastructure Pollution Prevention and Environmental Safety (WIPPES) Act ([S.1092](#)/[H.R.2269](#)) Sen. Jeff Merkley (D-OR), Rep. Lisa McClain (R-MI)

Status: Senate - 09/19/2025 Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders. Calendar No. 166.

House – 06/23/2025 Passed the House by voice vote.

Summary: This bill will require products with significant potential to be flushed to be labeled with "Do Not Flush" notices to protect pipe infrastructure.

Modification of the Aquifer Recharge Flexibility Act ([H.R.331](#), [S.1254](#)) Rep. Russ Fulcher (R-ID)

Status: House – 05/13/2025 Passed the House.

Senate - 04/02/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will allow holders of existing right-of-way grants to use them for aquifer recharge without needing additional authorization from the Secretary of the Interior.

To provide technical and financial assistance for groundwater recharge, aquifer storage, and water source substitution projects ([H.R.337](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will extend and increase funding for the Market Access Program (MAP) and Foreign Market Development (FMD) Program through Fiscal Year 2029.

Fair Access to Agriculture Disaster Programs Act ([H.R.2156/S.984](#)) Rep. Jimmy Panetta (D-CA), Sen. Alex Padilla

Status: House - 04/04/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on General Farm Commodities, Risk Management, and Credit.

Senate - 03/12/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will expand eligibility for USDA disaster assistance programs by waiving gross income limitations.

Advancing Water Reuse Act ([H.R.2940](#)) Rep. Darin LaHood (R-IL)

Summary: This bill will catalyze the use of recycled water by manufacturers, data centers, and other industrial entities.

Summary: This bill will expand forest management practices that have proven successful in reducing wildfire risks and promoting forest health, improving forest resiliency.

Status: House: 7/24/2025 Became law

Senate - 01/16/2025 Referred to the Committee on Finance.

Summary: This bill will grant the IRS the authority to postpone federal tax filing deadlines for taxpayers affected by state-declared disasters and states of emergency.

FEMA Independence Act ([H.R. 2308](#)) Rep. Jared Moskowitz (D-FL)

Status: House - 03/24/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Emergency Management and Technology.

Summary: This bill will remove FEMA from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and restore it as an independent, Cabinet-level agency.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability (WATER) Act of 2023 ([S.1730](#)) Sen. Bernard Sanders (I-VT)

Status: Senate - 05/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will assist communities in securing access to clean and reliable drinking water. This bill also contains provisions to combat PFAS and provide grants for low-income communities struggling with unaffordable water bills.

Veterans Exposed to Toxic PFAS Act ([H.R.3639](#)) Rep. Michael Lawler (R-NY)

Status: House - 06/06/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.

Summary: This bill provides eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs hospital care and medical services to veterans and their family members (including those in utero) who have specified conditions and resided at a military installation where individuals were exposed to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS.

National Prescribed Fire Act of 2025 ([H.R.3889](#), [S.2015](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA), Sen. Ron Wyden (D-OR)

Status: House - 06/10/2025 Referred to the Committee on Natural Resources, and in addition to the Committees on Agriculture, and Energy and Commerce.

Senate - 12/17/2025 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

Summary: This bill will increase funding for Forest Service and DOI for prescribed burns, establish a program for implementation of prescribed burns, establish a program for workforce development, and facilitate coordination between land managers and air quality agencies to alter prescribed burn practices to reduce catastrophic smoke events in the summer.

PFAS National Drinking Water Standard Act of 2025 ([H.R.4168](#)) Rep. Brian Fitzpatrick (R-PA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will codify the EPA's final PFAS National Primary Drinking Water Regulation, establishing enforceable maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for six of the most hazardous PFAS chemicals, including PFOA and PFOS, in public drinking water systems.

WILTR Act of 2025 ([H.R.4181](#)) Rep. Darrell Issa (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/26/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will incentivize wildfire prevention infrastructure and landowner preparedness through targeted tax relief.

The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (Healthy H2O Act) ([H.R.4721](#), [S.2436](#)) Rep. David Rouzer (R-NC), Sen. Tammy Baldwin (D-WI)

Status: House - 07/23/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Agriculture.

Senate - 07/24/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: This bill will provide grants through the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water quality testing and to purchase and install point-of-entry water filtration systems to remove contaminants from drinking water.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program Reauthorization Act of 2025 ([S.2437](#)) Sen. John Hickenlooper (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 07/24/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program which provides grants to advance emerging snow monitoring technology that improve water supply predictions.

Fixing Emergency Management for Americans (FEMA) Act ([H.R.4669](#)) Rep. Sam Graves (R-MO)

Status: House - 09/03/2025 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by the Yeas and Nays: 57 - 3

Summary: This bill will authorize and improve the Federal Emergency Management Agency and reform Federal disaster mitigation, preparedness, response, and recovery.

Water Infrastructure Resiliency Act ([H.R.5513](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 09/20/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will clarify eligible uses under the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) to include modern software tools for the modernization of infrastructure.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([H.R.5566](#)) Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will fund upgrades to drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure to make them more resilient against threats by reauthorizing the following programs: Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and the Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program.

Water Infrastructure Subcontractor and Taxpayer Protection Act ([H.R.1285](#), [S.570](#)) Rep. Mike Bost (R-IL), Se. Mark Kelly (D-AZ)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Senate - 02/13/2025 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires prime contractors on federally funded water infrastructure projects to pay subcontractors promptly and ensures federal oversight to prevent misuse of taxpayer funds.

Water Resources Technical Assistance Review Act ([H.R.3427](#)) Rep. David Taylor (R-OH)

Status: House – 09/15/2025 Passed out of the House.

Senate - 09/16/2025 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: Requires the Army Corps of Engineers to review, assess, and report on the effectiveness of its technical assistance programs for water resources projects, ensuring they meet the needs of local communities and stakeholders.

Golden Mussel Eradication and Control Act of 2025 ([H.R.3717](#)) Rep. Josh Harder (D-CA)

Status: House - 06/04/2025 Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure and the Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: Directs federal efforts to control and eradicate invasive golden mussel populations in U.S. waterways to protect ecosystems and infrastructure.

Regional Leadership in Wildland Fire Research Act ([H.R.6154](#), [S.647](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA), Sen. Ben Ray Lujan (D-NM)

Status: House - 11/19/2025 Referred to the Committee on Natural Resources, and the Committees on Agriculture, and Science, Space, and Technology.

Senate - 02/20/2025 Referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will establish research centers at higher education institutions across the country to support wildfire research and develop new technologies to enhance wildfire preparedness.

Standardizing Permitting and Expediting Economic Development (SPEED) Act ([H.R.4776](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR)

Status: House – 12/18/2025 Passed by the Yeas and Nays: 221 – 196.

Senate - 12/18/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Summary: This bill will narrow the scope of federal actions which trigger a NEPA review by redefining the term “major federal actions” and will also expedite the review process.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Midsize and Large Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience Program, Drinking Water System Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Program, and Clean Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Program for five years.

Unincorporated Partnerships for Grant Resources, Assistance, and Drinking Water Enhancements (UPGRADE) Act ([S. 3465](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE)

Status: Senate - 12/11/2025 Referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works

Summary: This bill will amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize the EPA's Small, Underserved, and Disadvantaged Communities grant program through 2031 and make unincorporated communities eligible for funding to improve access to clean water.

PFAS Research and Development Reauthorization Act ([H.R. 6667](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will extend EPA's authority and funding to conduct research and development on PFAS after its prior authorization expired.

No Taxation on PFAS Remediation Act ([H.R. 6669](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 12/11/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This bill will amend the Internal Revenue Code to ensure that reimbursements or rebates used for PFAS cleanup are excluded from gross income for tax purposes.

Clean Water Standards for PFAS Act ([H.R. 6668](#)) Rep. Chris Pappas (D-NH)

Status: House - 02/02/2026 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will require the EPA to establish effluent limitation guidelines and water quality criteria for PFAS discharges under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, setting regulatory deadlines for industry controls.

Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Act ([S.3609](#), [H.R.582](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA), Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/08/2026 Referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.

House - 01/21/2025 Referred to the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, and in addition to the Committees on Natural Resources, and Agriculture

Summary: This bill will create a new federal grant program to invest \$1 billion annually to help communities develop and implement Community Protection and Wildfire Resilience Plans

Making Our Communities Resilient through Enhancing Water for Agriculture, Technology, the Environment, and Residences (MORE WATER) Act ([S.3738](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: 01/29/2026 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR) large-scale recycled water program, providing federal grants for up to 25% of the cost of these recycling projects, and would create a new federal grant program to help repair California's water delivery system.

Growing Resilient Operations from Water Savings and Municipal- Agricultural Reciprocally-beneficial Transactions (GROW SMART) Act ([S.3737](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: 01/29/2026 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will authorize \$5 million per year for seven years for the BOR to fund the development of voluntary agricultural partnerships with municipal, industrial, and commercial entities and the design of innovative water-saving projects.

Firefighting Infrastructure for Rural and Exurban Smaller Municipalities Augmenting Residential Fuels Treatments Act (FIRE SMART ACT) (Not yet on Congress.gov) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status:

Summary: This bill will make projects that have both drinking water benefits and fire suppression benefits in rural communities eligible for Drinking Water State Revolving Funds (DWSRF) loans.

Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Amendments of 2025 ([H.R.6229](#)) Rep. Kim Schrier (D-WA)

Status: House - 11/22/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014 through 2029, lowers minimum project sizes for small communities, allows up to 55-year loan maturities, and promotes collaborative project delivery.

Western Wildfire Support Act ([S.91](#), [H.R.5782](#)) Rep. Joe Neguse (D-CO),

Status: Senate - 02/04/2026 Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Economic Development, Public Buildings, and Emergency Management.

Summary: This bill will provide comprehensive resources to prevent wildfires, enhance firefighting efforts, and support communities impacted by year-round wildfire seasons.

To require the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out activities to suppress wildfires ([H.R.178](#)) Rep. Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/08/2026 Reported (Amended) by the Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to carry out wildfire suppression and to not suppress wildfire fighting efforts.

Advanced Capabilities for Emergency Response Operations (ACERO) Act ([H.R.3930](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 06/11/2025 Ordered to be Reported in the Nature of a Substitute by the Yeas and Nays: 34 - 0.

Senate - 02/24/2026 Received in the Senate and referred to the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation.

Summary: This bill will authorize the ACERO program which conducts research and development activities regarding aerial response to wildfires using uncrewed aircraft systems (UAS) and other advanced aviation technologies.

Save Our Sequoias Act ([H.R.2709](#)) Rep. Vince Fong (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/12/2026 Placed on the Union Calendar, Calendar No. 466

Summary: This bill will establish a set of programs to improve the health and resiliency of giant sequoias, including shared stewardship agreements, emergency response, reforestation strategies, and collaborative restoration grants.

Snow Water Supply Forecasting Reauthorization Act ([H.R.3857](#)) Rep. Jeff Hurd (R-CO)

Status: Senate - 12/11/2025 Received in the Senate and Read twice and referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize and modify the Bureau of Reclamation's Snow Water Supply Forecasting Program through FY2031.

Water Infrastructure Resilience and Sustainability Act ([S.3590](#), [H.R.5566](#)) Sen. Lisa Blunt Rochester (D-DE), Rep. Salud Carbajal (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/07/2026 Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

House - 12/01/2025 Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.

Summary: This bill will amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act to reauthorize the clean water infrastructure resiliency and sustainability program, and amend the Safe Drinking Water Act to reauthorize drinking water resilience and midsize/large system sustainability programs.

Subject: March 2026 Monthly Report

The Legislature is officially in full swing again. With the bill introduction deadline passed, the 2026 legislative year is beginning to take shape. One of the dominant policy fights this year is likely to center on funding. Senator Jerry McNerney has proposed dedicating \$300 million annually from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) to address subsidence affecting the State Water Project and to support improvements to Sacramento–San Joaquin Delta levees. Subsidence in the San Joaquin Valley has significantly reduced the capacity of the California Aqueduct, making the issue increasingly urgent for state water supply reliability. Supporters argue that using climate funds for these investments is appropriate because subsidence is closely linked to groundwater overdraft driven by climate-induced water shortages and because levee stability is critical to protecting the state’s primary water delivery system.

At the same time, competition for these funds is intense. A number of stakeholders are seeking significant allocations from the GGRF for climate resilience, agriculture, transportation electrification, air quality, and other greenhouse-gas reduction programs. These pressures are occurring while the state is focused on implementing voter-approved funding from Proposition 4 (California 2024), which will require agencies and the Legislature to prioritize how those bond dollars are deployed across drinking water, flood protection, ecosystem restoration, and climate adaptation programs.

Overlaying these funding debates is another major policy push from environmental justice organizations to establish a statewide low-income water rate assistance program. Advocates have long argued that rising water rates, driven by infrastructure costs, drought, and regulatory requirements, are creating affordability challenges for vulnerable communities. While the concept has broad policy support, the primary obstacle has been identifying a stable funding source. The State Water Board has stated that a statewide program could cost \$600 million or more. As a result, proposals to fund such a program through statewide revenues are likely to become part of the broader debate over limited state climate and water funding.

All of these priorities are competing against a difficult fiscal backdrop. California faces a constrained budget outlook over the next several years, with slowing revenue growth and significant existing commitments in areas such as housing, climate programs, and education. As a result, the Legislature will likely face difficult trade-offs between infrastructure investments, affordability programs, and environmental priorities. For water policy in particular, the central question this session may be less about identifying policy solutions and more about determining which priorities receive funding in an increasingly tight fiscal environment.

Key Bills

AB 35 (Alvarez-D) Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024: Administrative Procedure Act: exemption: program guidelines and selection criteria

This bill would exempt Proposition 4 funding from the regulatory requirements of the Administrative Procedures Act, which would allow state agencies to disperse funds more efficiently. While typically, the regulatory process is an important part of policy settings, Proposition 4 intentionally allocated funding to existing grant programs so that funding could be allocated. However, in the crafting of Proposition 4, an exemption from the APA was not included in the language. AB 35 would establish the exemption and contains an urgency clause so the bill would take effect immediately.

Status: On the Assembly Floor

AB 2180 (Ward-D) Local government: Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act: proportional cost of service

This bill would clarify how water agencies comply with Proposition 218, particularly when setting tiered water rates. There have been several conflicting appellate court decisions in recent years that create confusion regarding Prop 218 compliance. AB 2180 would codify the more favorable framework established in Dreher v. LADWP and affirm that costs related to water supplies, infrastructure, and system-wide peak demand may be allocated using reasonable methodologies without tracing specific water sources to individual parcels. These methodologies could rely on existing or projected data to allocate service costs.

Position: Key Watch

Status: Assembly Local Government Committee hearing March 25.

SB 872 (McNerney-D) Climate change: funding priorities

This bill would provide \$150 million annually for 21 years to the California Department of Water Resources to restore State Water Project conveyance capacity damaged by land subsidence, prioritizing projects tied to groundwater sustainability efforts. It also provides \$150 million annually for 21 years to the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Conservancy to improve Delta levees, including multibenefit projects that enhance habitat and water quality within the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. It expressly prohibits using these funds for new Delta conveyance facilities and allows proportional reductions if cap-and-trade revenues are insufficient. Addressing the impact of subsidence on the State Water Project is the highest priority in 2026 for the State Water Contractors.

Position: Support (Coalition)

Status: Will be heard in the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on March 18

SB 1153 (Caballero-D) Disaster preparedness: urban retail water suppliers and public water systems: wildfire

SB 1153, sponsored by ACWA, seeks to provide liability protection for water agencies related to wildfires. The bill would establish that limitations in water supply or water pressure during a wildfire are not a substantial cause of wildfire damages. In addition, the bill would clarify that wildfire spread is not an inherent risk of the design, construction, or maintenance of a public water system. If passed, the bill would require urban retail water suppliers serving high or very high fire hazard severity zones to include wildfire-specific response procedures in their emergency response plans beginning Jan. 1, 2028.

Large Electric Load Considerations

On February 5, the California Independent System Operator held a stakeholder information session regarding the increasing electricity demand over the next 5-10 years by new large loads. The CEC forecasts that data center load, along with electric vehicle charging, and electrification of agricultural and industrial processes, will increase by 1.8 GW by 2030 and 4.9 GW by 2040.

New Vehicle Emissions Testing Requirements

CARB will host online webinars covering vehicle testing requirements for the Clean Truck Check program that began in October 2024 (Program). The Program aims to achieve State Implementation Plan commitments and move closer to meeting federal ambient air quality standards and improving public health.

Summary: Under existing law, the State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality and prescribe waste discharge requirements in accordance with the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act (act) and the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit program. Under the act, the State Water Resources Control Board is authorized to adopt water quality control plans for waters for which quality standards are required by the federal Clean Water Act, as specified, and that in the event of a conflict, those plans supersede regional water quality control plans for the same waters. This bill would authorize the state board to adopt water quality control plans for nexus waters, which the bill would define as all waters of the state that are not also navigable, except as specified. The bill would require any water quality standard that was submitted to, and approved by, or is awaiting approval by, the United States Environmental Protection Agency or the state board that applied to nexus waters as of May 24, 2023, to remain in effect, as provided. The bill would require the state board and regional boards to include nexus waters in all federal Clean Water Act processes, including, but not limited to, the California Integrated Report and the establishment of total maximum daily loads, as specified. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, requires all groundwater basins designated as high- or medium-priority basins by the Department of Water Resources to be

managed under a groundwater sustainability plan or coordinated groundwater sustainability plans, except as specified. Existing law requires the department to periodically review the groundwater sustainability plans developed by groundwater sustainability agencies pursuant to the act to evaluate whether a plan conforms with specified laws and is likely to achieve the sustainability goal for the basin covered by the plan. Existing law requires a groundwater sustainability agency to evaluate its groundwater sustainability plan periodically. This bill would require a groundwater sustainability agency to, at least once every 7 years, review, and update if appropriate, its sustainable yield to ensure that the sustainable yield is based on the best available information and best available science, as defined, and will achieve sustainable groundwater management. The bill would also require a groundwater sustainability agency to provide an opportunity for public review and comment before making a determination whether to update its sustainable yield. To the extent that these requirements impose additional duties on groundwater sustainability agencies that are local agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. Summary: Existing law, known as the Administrative Procedure Act, governs the procedures for the adoption, amendment, or repeal of regulations by state agencies and for the review of those regulatory actions by the Office of Administrative Law. Existing law requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal an administrative regulation to, among other things, assess the potential for adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals, and requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation on or after November 1, 2013, to prepare and submit to the Department of Finance for comment, a standardized regulatory impact analysis, as provided. Existing law defines “major regulation” for purposes of the act to mean any proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation subject to review by the office that will have an economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals in an amount exceeding \$50,000,000, as provided. Existing law establishes procedures for the adoption of emergency regulations, including requiring that the state agency make a finding that the adoption of a regulation or order of repeal is necessary to address an emergency, as defined. Under existing law, a regulation, amendment, or order of repeal adopted as an emergency regulatory action may only remain in effect for up to 180 days, unless the adopting agency complies with specified requirements. This bill would prohibit a state agency from taking final action to adopt a major regulation until certain requirements are met, including that after the state agency prepares a standardized regulatory impact analysis and submits the analysis to the Department of Finance, as described above, the state agency submits a proposal to the Legislature recommending legislation to authorize the adoption of the major regulation and the Legislature enacts a law expressly authorizing the state agency to adopt that major regulation. The bill, notwithstanding that prohibition, would authorize a state agency to adopt an emergency regulation that is a major regulation if the

state agency complies with specified requirements governing the adoption of emergency regulations. The bill would prohibit the emergency regulation from being in effect more than 180 days, except that the state agency may twice readopt an emergency regulation that is the same or substantially equivalent to the emergency regulation previously adopted for a period not to exceed 90 days, if the state agency prepares a standardized regulatory impact analysis and submits the analysis to the Department of Finance for comment, as described above, and the state agency submits a proposal to the Legislature recommending legislation to authorize the adoption of the major regulation.

Summary: Existing law, the Administrative Procedure Act, sets forth the requirements for the adoption, publication, review, and implementation of regulations by state agencies. The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024 (act), approved by the voters as Proposition 4 at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election, authorized the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and outdoor access, and clean air programs. Existing law authorizes certain regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act to be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. Existing law requires the emergency regulations to be filed with the Office of Administrative Law and requires the emergency regulations to remain in effect until repealed or amended by the adopting state agency. This bill, notwithstanding the above, would exempt the adoption of regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act from the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. The bill would require a state entity that receives funding to administer a competitive grant program established using the Administrative Procedure Act exemption to do certain things, including develop draft project solicitation and evaluation guidelines and to submit those guidelines to the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency, except as provided. The bill would require the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to post an electronic form of the guidelines submitted by a state entity and the subsequent verifications on the Natural Resources Agency’s internet website. The bill would authorize the use of certain previously developed program guidelines and selection criteria for these purposes, as provided. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Existing law, the California Emergency Services Act, requires all public water systems, as defined, with 10,000 or more service connections to review and revise their disaster preparedness plans in conjunction with related agencies, including, but not limited to, local fire departments and the Office of Emergency Services to ensure that the plans are sufficient to address possible disaster scenarios. A person, as defined, who violates the provisions of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill, beginning January 1, 2028, would require all urban retail water suppliers, as defined, serving a high or very high fire hazard severity zone to include incident-specified response procedures for wildfires as part of their disaster preparedness plans, including any applicable emergency response plan as required by federal law. The bill would require these plans to include mitigation actions, including actions, procedures, and equipment, that can obviate or significantly lessen the impact of a wildfire on the water system and the supply of drinking water provided by the water supplier. Because violation of these requirements by certain urban retail water suppliers would constitute a misdemeanor, the bill would expand the scope of a crime, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. This bill would deem the inability of a public water system to maintain water supply or water pressure during a wildfire not a substantial cause of the damages resulting from a wildfire. The bill would also deem the spread of wildfire not an inherent risk presented by the deliberate design, construction, or maintenance of a public water system. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Summary: Under existing law, the California Renewables Portfolio Standard Program requires retail sellers and local publicly owned electric utilities to procure a minimum quantity of electricity products from eligible renewable energy resources during certain compliance periods up to December 31, 2030. Existing law provides that a local publicly owned electric utility is not required to procure a certain amount of eligible renewable energy resources if, during a year within those compliance periods, the local publicly owned electric utility receives more than 40% of its retail sales from large hydroelectric generation under an ownership agreement or contract in effect as of January 1, 2018. Existing law authorizes the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission (Energy Commission) to establish appropriate multiyear compliance periods for local

publicly owned electric utilities beyond December 31, 2030. This bill would provide that the provision related to the procurement of eligible renewable energy resources by local publicly owned electric utilities also applies to the compliance periods established by the Energy Commission.

Summary: Existing law establishes, within the office of the Governor, the Office of Emergency Services (OES), under the direction of the Director of Emergency Services. Existing law charges the OES with coordinating various emergency activities within the state. The California Emergency Services Act, contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature, requires the OES to enter into a joint powers agreement pursuant to the Joint Exercise of Powers Act with the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection to develop and administer a comprehensive wildfire mitigation program relating to structure hardening and retrofitting and prescribed fuel modification activities. Existing law authorizes the joint powers authority to establish financial assistance limits and matching funding or other recipient contribution requirements for the program, as provided. This bill, contingent upon appropriation by the Legislature, would establish the Rural Water Infrastructure for Wildfire Resilience Program within the OES for the distribution of state matching funds to urban wildland interface communities, as defined, in designated high fire hazard severity zones or very high fire hazard severity zones to improve water system infrastructure, as prescribed. The bill would require the OES to work in coordination with the Department of Water Resources, the State Water Resources Control Board, the Office of the State Fire Marshal, and other state entities as the OES determines to be appropriate, to achieve the purposes of the program. The bill would require the OES to develop criteria and a scoring methodology to prioritize the distribution of state matching funds provided under the program to rural communities based upon specified criteria.

Summary: The California Endangered Species Act prohibits the taking of an endangered, threatened, or candidate species, except as specified. Under the act, the Department of Fish and Wildlife may authorize the take of listed species by certain entities through permits or memorandums

of understanding for specified purposes. The act allows take by permit if, among other things, the impact of the authorized take is fully minimized and mitigated. This bill would provide that if an at-risk species, as defined, becomes listed as an endangered, threatened, or candidate species, further authorization or approval shall not be required for a take of that species, if specified conditions are met, including that the potential listing of the at-risk species was anticipated in a permit previously issued by the department for incidental take caused by a renewable electrical generation facility. The bill would authorize the department, in partnership with a permit applicant for an incidental take caused by a renewable electrical generation facility, to develop a research project that evaluates specified factors. The bill would authorize a research project reviewed and approved by the department to contribute to a renewable electrical generation project's mitigation, as provided. The bill would require the department to report to the Legislature specified information, including among other things, a report on each at-risk species authorized for take, as provided.

In that regard, existing law requires each local agency, by January 1, 2025, to develop a program for the preapproval of accessory dwelling unit plans. This bill would require each local agency, as defined, to develop a program for the preapproval of single-family and multifamily residential housing plans, whereby the local agency accepts single-family and multifamily plan submissions for preapproval and approves or denies the preapproval applications, as specified. The bill would require a large jurisdiction, as defined, to develop this program by July 1, 2027, and a small jurisdiction, as defined, to develop a program by January 1, 2029. The bill would require the local agency to post preapproved single-family or multifamily residential housing plans and the contact information of the applicant on the local agency's internet website. This bill would require a local agency to either approve or deny ministerially an application for a single-family or multifamily residential housing unit within 30 days if the lot meets certain conditions and the application utilizes specified plans that have been preapproved by the local agency or that are identical to a plan used in an application approved by the local agency. The bill would prohibit the preapproval program from applying to single-family or multifamily residential housing plans intended for use in certain communities and developments, as specified. Existing law requires a local agency to designate, by ordinance, moderate, high, and very high fire hazard severity zones in its jurisdiction within 120 days of receiving recommendations from the State Fire Marshal, as provided. This bill would require a water supplier that services more than 100 customers that are located in a moderate, high, or very high fire hazard severity zone, as specified, to establish an emergency preparedness plan for response to red flag warnings, extreme weather events, and other major power outages or emergencies that pose a potential threat to providing adequate water service. Summary: Existing law establishes the Natural Resources Agency and vests the agency with jurisdiction over various public resources. Existing law establishes the California Environmental Protection Agency and sets out its mission for programs, policies, and standards. Under existing law, various state entities, including the California Coastal Commission, the California Environmental Protection Agency, and the Department of Fish and Wildlife have responsibilities with respect to coastal permitting and development. This bill would require the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency, in consultation with the Secretary for Environmental Protection, to convene a Coastal Resilience Permitting Working Group for the purpose of developing a Coastal Resilience Permitting Roadmap for coastal resilience projects proposed in specified areas. The bill would require the Coastal Resilience Permitting Working Group to consist of representatives from federal, state, and local agencies, including, among others, the California Coastal Commission, the California Environmental Protection Agency, and the Department of Fish and Wildlife. The bill would, on or before January 1, 2028, require the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to submit the Coastal Resilience Permitting Roadmap to the Governor and the relevant fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature. Summary: Existing law requires a plaintiff who files an action to comprehensively determine rights to extract groundwater from a basin to provide the court a draft notice of commencement of groundwater basin adjudication and a draft form answer to adjudication complaint, as specified. Existing law also requires a plaintiff to file, within a specified timeframe, a motion for approval of the draft notice and draft form answer. Under existing law, once the court approves the draft notice, the plaintiff is required to serve the notice, as specified. Following a court order approving both the notice and draft form answer and authorizing service thereof, existing law requires the plaintiff to take additional steps to provide notice to defendants including, but not limited to, mailing, by registered mail or certified mail, return receipt requested, the notice, complaint, and form answer to all holders of fee title to real property in the basin. Under existing law, if a return receipt is not received for a parcel of real property, the plaintiff must post a copy of the notice, complaint, and form answer in a conspicuous place on the real property. After completing these notice procedures, existing law requires the plaintiff to file a notice of completion of the mailing with the court. This bill would impose additional requirements on a plaintiff when filing the notice of completion of mailing. The bill would require the plaintiff to include with the notice of completion an affidavit of the person who mailed the notice and the certified or registered mail delivery receipt for each parcel showing the date, time, and place of mailing. The bill would also require the delivery receipt to be signed by the party served or their legally authorized representative. If a return receipt is not received for a parcel of real property, the bill would require the plaintiff to also include with the notice of completion an affidavit of the person who posted the notice specifying the date, time, and physical location of each parcel where the posting occurred, accompanied by a photograph depicting the posted notice.

Summary: The California Constitution specifies various requirements with respect to the levying of assessments and property-related fees and charges by a local agency. As part of those requirements, the California Constitution mandates that such fees or charges that are extended, imposed, or increased satisfy certain requirements, including, but not limited to, that the amount of the fee or charge imposed upon any parcel or person as an incident of property ownership not exceed the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel. Existing law, known as the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act (act), prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with these requirements and, among other things, authorizes an agency providing water, wastewater, sewer, or refuse collection services to adopt a schedule of fees or charges authorizing automatic adjustments that pass through increases in wholesale charges for

water, sewage treatment, or wastewater treatment or adjustments for inflation under certain circumstances. This bill would authorize a local government to demonstrate the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel by any method that reasonably allocates the ascertainable cost of providing service to all parcels, if substantiated as provided. The bill would, however, provide that for water or sewer service fee or charge impositions, a local government is not required to provide an exact measure of the cost of the service at each parcel and may instead impose uniform or tiered rates to parcel or customer classes that are defined based on common characteristics indicative of likely water or sewer use. The bill would provide that the proportional cost of service within each tier of water service may be substantiated by using any reasonable basis for allocating costs attributed to the tier, as described, and would provide a local government discretion to determine the costs allocated to each tier as long as the rate for each tier does not exceed the proportional cost of service reasonably allocated to parcels subject to

Under the act, the

state board and the regional boards prescribe waste discharge requirements for the discharge of waste that could affect the quality of the waters of the state. This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board to require the regional boards to update the Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program in order to reduce nitrogen waste discharges from commercial irrigated agricultural areas, as provided. The bill would require the regional boards to adopt revised orders with waste discharge requirements on or before January 1, 2028, that are sufficient to meet certain reductions in nitrogen waste discharges. The bill would require the state board to, on or before July 1, 2027, publish both a list of standardized crop names and categories, and a statewide methodology for calculating, and field-level reporting of, nitrogen balances for croplands, including nitrogen fertilizer applications and nitrogen discharges, that account for available soil nitrogen, to be used by the regional boards and incorporated into the revised orders. The bill would require the state board, on or before January 1, 2031, and in coordination with the regional boards, to submit a report to the relevant policy committees of the Legislature on progress achieved in implementing these requirements, including data on the extent of progress made toward reducing nitrogen waste discharges, as provided. The act authorizes the state board to include in its regulation of those emissions the use of market-based compliance mechanisms. Existing law requires all moneys, except for fines and penalties, collected by the state board from the auction or sale of allowances as part of a market-based compliance mechanism to be deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund. Existing law requires, beginning with 2026–27 fiscal year, that funds be allocated according to

a specified priority, including, among other things, that the sum of \$1,000,000,000 be reserved for appropriation by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act or other statute. This bill would require, of that amount, beginning with the 2026–27 fiscal year and continuing through the 2046–47 fiscal year, the sum of \$150,000,000 be appropriated annually, to the Department of Water Resources for the purposes of supporting capital improvements to restore the original design water conveyance capacity for state water conveyance systems impacted operationally by land subsidence, and the sum of \$150,000,000 be appropriated annually to the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta Conservancy for projects in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to improve existing levees, as specified, thereby making an appropriation. This bill would require the Department of Housing and Community Development, in consultation with other specified state agencies, within 30 days of a state of emergency declared by the Governor relating to a wildfire, to provide a report to the Governor and the Legislature identifying state permitting requirements that may unduly impede efforts to rebuild properties or facilities destroyed as a result of the wildfire that should be considered for suspension. The bill would also require the department, in consultation with other specified state agencies, within 60 days of a state of emergency relating to a wildfire, to review and provide a report to the Governor and the Legislature with recommendations regarding any provision of the California Building Standards Code that should be suspended for specified projects in order to facilitate rapid, safe, and cost-effective rebuilding and recovery. The bill would further require the department, upon the declaration of a state of emergency relating to a wildfire, to coordinate with local governments to identify and recommend procedures to establish rapid permitting and approval processes to expedite the reconstruction or replacement of residential properties destroyed or damaged by the wildfire, and would require the department, within 60 days of the state of emergency, to submit a report to the Governor and the Legislature with those recommendations. This bill, except as provided, would require, upon the Governor's declaration of a state of emergency relating to a wildfire, every state agency or political subdivision, as defined, involved in postdisaster response, debris removal, reconstruction, housing, or land-use permitting to accept electronic submission of any application, form, plan set, appeal, or request for state agency or political subdivision action related to recovery efforts for that state of emergency, as provided. The APA requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal an administrative regulation to, among other things, assess the potential for adverse economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals, and requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation to prepare and submit to the Department of Finance for review, a standardized regulatory impact analysis, as provided. The APA defines “major regulation,” for purposes of the act, to mean any proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation subject to review by the OAL that will have an

economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals in an amount exceeding \$50,000,000, as provided. The APA provides exceptions for emergency regulations in the case of a situation that calls for immediate action to avoid serious harm to the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare. This bill would prohibit a major regulation from taking effect until the Legislature enacts a law to approve the regulation, except as provided for emergency regulations. If the Legislature fails to enact a law to approve the regulation or does not vote on the regulation within 60 days of receiving the regulation from the office, the bill would require that the regulation be deemed disapproved. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Existing law authorizes a special district to replace this annual audit with a financial review, or, until January 1, 2027, an agreed-upon procedures engagement or an annual financial compilation of the special district, if specified conditions are met, including that the special district's annual revenues do not exceed \$150,000. Until January 1, 2027, upon receipt of the financial review, agreed-upon procedures engagement, or financial compilation, existing law authorizes a county auditor to appoint a certified public accountant or a public accountant to conduct an audit of the special district, as specified. This bill would remove the January 1, 2027, repeal date referenced above, and would increase the revenue cap described above to \$250,000.

Existing law authorizes officers of the Department of the California Highway Patrol, police departments, marshal's office or sheriff's office, and officers or employees of the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection or the Department of Fish and Wildlife designated as peace officers to close to all unauthorized persons an area where a menace to the public health or safety created by a calamity exists for the duration of the menace and the immediate area surrounding any emergency field command post or any other command post activated for the purpose of abating a calamity, riot, or other civil disturbance, as specified. This bill would require the Office of Emergency Services to develop a water utility worker identification program to issue identification cards to employees of a city, county, city and county, special district, water corporation, or mutual water company that provides water utility services to authorize access to an area during or following a flood, storm, fire, earthquake, or other disaster, for the purpose of protection of public health and safety, preservation of life and property, and repair and restoration of water service. This bill would require the application for a water utility worker identification card to be signed by a duly authorized representative of a water utility and include a certification by the water utility. Because this certification would be under penalty of perjury, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program by expanding the definition of a crime. This bill would authorize the office to impose and collect a fee from a water utility for an identification card that does not exceed the reasonable costs of the identification card program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

The act requires a state agency proposing to adopt, amend, or repeal a major regulation to satisfy additional requirements, including by requiring the state agency to prepare a standardized regulatory impact analysis in the manner prescribed by the Department of Finance, as specified, and requires the analysis to address certain items, including the creation or elimination of jobs within the state and the competitive advantages or disadvantages for businesses currently doing business within the state. The act defines “major regulation” to mean a proposed adoption, amendment, or repeal of a regulation subject to review by the Office of Administrative Law, as specified, that will have an economic impact on California business enterprises and individuals in an amount exceeding \$50,000,000, as estimated by the agency. This bill would require an agency, in estimating the economic impact of adopting, amending, or repealing a regulation, to identify and calculate any offsetting benefits, impacts, or savings that might result directly or indirectly from that adoption, amendment, or repeal and factor those benefits, impacts, or savings into its economic impact estimate.

This bill would require the board to, on or before May 1, 2027, and on or before May 1 of each year thereafter, develop a drinking water needs assessment, as specified. Summary: Existing law, the California Emergency Services Act, requires all public water systems, as defined, with 10,000 or more service connections to review and revise their disaster preparedness plans in conjunction with related agencies, including, but not limited to, local fire departments and the Office of Emergency Services, to ensure that the plans are sufficient to address possible disaster scenarios. A person, as defined, who violates the provisions of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. Existing law requires these public water systems, following a declared state of emergency, to furnish an assessment of their emergency response and recommendations to the Legislature within 6 months after each disaster, and to implement the recommendations in a timely manner. Existing law requires the office to establish emergency response and recovery plans in coordination with these public water systems. Existing law, the California Safe Drinking Water Act, requires the State Water Resources Control Board to administer provisions relating to the regulation of drinking water to protect public health. This bill would require a disaster-impacted public water system, as defined, to conduct a disaster impact assessment within 6 months of a disaster, in coordination with the disaster-impacted county, as defined, before receiving state funding. The bill would require the assessment to include specified components, including determining whether the best interest of the affected residences, as defined, requires becoming a consolidated water system in order to ensure access to quality water and adequate supply, as provided. The bill would require the assessment to be provided to the State Water Resources Control Board. The bill would require a disaster-impacted public water system, in coordination with the disaster-impacted county, to adopt specified requirements into its assessment process, including making the coordinating bodies subject to the California Public Records Act, providing the opportunity for public comment, and arranging for live translations, as provided. Because a violation of these requirements by certain public water systems would constitute a misdemeanor, the bill would expand the scope of a crime, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

DISCUSSION

Mesa Water's governmental relations program includes monitoring local and regional political issues and policy-setting authorities (e.g., County of Orange, Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission). Attached is the Orange County Advocacy Report. At the Board's March 25, 2026 meeting, Mesa Water staff will provide a verbal report on any actionable, relevant and/or timely issues.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2026, \$450,000 is budgeted for Water Policy Support Services; \$242,130 has been spent to date.

COUNTY OF ORANGE UPDATES

Governance, Legal, & Accountability

OC Supervisors Respond to Grand Jury Criticism on Salary Hike

The Orange County Grand Jury criticized the Board of Supervisors' 25% salary increase to \$244,000 as "tone-deaf" and lacking transparency, approved amid budget shortfalls and scandals. The Board rejected rescinding the raise, citing state law prohibiting reductions during terms, and committed to improved accountability.

OC Supervisors Conducting National Search for New County CEO

The Board launched a national search for a new CEO to replace retiring Michelle Aguirre, emphasizing candidates with California county experience and integrity. The process, led by HR firm Wendi Brown Creative Partners, aims to fill the role by mid-2026.

Orange County Greenlights Voluntary Climate Action Plan

The Board approved a non-binding climate plan to secure state grants, encouraging emission reductions without mandates. The debate focused on the voluntary nature to avoid developer confusion. It includes EV charging and solar recommendations.

Orange County Mental Health Campus Lawsuit

Mind OC sued the county in 2024 over lease termination for Be Well OC facilities; the county countersued in March 2026, alleging fraud, conflicts, and lease breaches, seeking \$64.5 million. The unopened \$86 million Irvine campus remains stalled amid disputes.

OC Power Authority Lawsuit

The OC Power Authority sued the county for breach of contract, seeking \$1 million in damages over energy procurement agreements. The suit alleges unfulfilled commitments.

County Audit: Former Supervisor Do Forced Through Spending Without Oversight

A county audit revealed Andrew Do and his chief of staff steered \$486 million in contracts without proper oversight, including \$800,000 to a double-billing firm and festival grants to allies. The review highlighted a lack of documentation and competitive bidding.

Audit Clears CalOptima of Fraud Tied to Andrew Do as Membership Drops

A forensic audit found no fraud or improper fund diversion during Andrew Do's CalOptima tenure but noted undisclosed conflicts of interest, leading to \$12,000 in fines. In addition, CalOptima reported a 13% membership drop to 822,000 due to immigration policies and eligibility changes.



OC Treasurer Tries to Fire Deputy After She Pulls Papers to Run for Her Seat

Treasurer Shari Freidenrich attempted to fire deputy Dana Schultz after she filed to run against her, sparking ethics concerns. Schultz remains employed pending a hearing.

Elections for Board of Supervisors, Board of Education, and Other County Seats

The Fourth District supervisor race features Buena Park Mayor Connor Traut, Fullerton Mayor Fred Jung, trustee Tim Shaw, and councilwoman Rose Espinoza. Fifth District incumbent Katrina Foley faces Assemblywoman Diane Dixon and educator Lucy Vellema. Other races include treasurer, clerk-recorder, superintendent, education board, and assessor, with over two dozen candidates.

Former OC Prosecutor Wins \$3.5 Million Jury Verdict in Sexual Harassment Case

A jury awarded \$3.5 million to prosecutor Bethel Cope-Vega for sexual harassment by a DA lieutenant and the county's failure to address it. This is the second such verdict, following a \$3 million award to Tracy Miller. The county has spent \$11 million defending related cases, with four more pending.

Orange County Judges Face Potential Recall

The Commission on Judicial Performance rarely removes judges, dismissing 97% of complaints, with actions ranging from admonishments to suspensions. A reform group has launched a recall campaign against 12 probate and family court judges, alleging bias and due process violations.

Former OC Judge Convicted in Fraud Scheme Appears to be Practicing Law Again

Former Judge Israel Claustro, who pleaded guilty to felony mail fraud in a workers' comp scheme, reactivated his law license and is practicing family law. No prohibition from his plea agreement, but a State Bar consumer alert was added. Sentencing is set for June 2026.

Health & Social Services

Healthcare Workers Strike at OC Hospitals

Over 3,000 Kaiser workers struck for better pay and staffing, ending with a tentative agreement. Kindred caregivers also struck, affecting two OC hospitals and highlighting labor tensions in healthcare.

California Animal Shelters Reform

Advocates sent cease-and-desist letters to 150 shelters, including OC Animal Care and Laguna Beach, alleging violations like poor conditions. The letters demand reforms to reduce euthanasia under the Hayden Act. OC supervisors requested updates on shelter improvements.



Infrastructure & Environment

Grand Jury Report Recommends More Public Transit from OC to LAX

OC residents make 9.9 million LAX trips annually, but public options are inefficient due to transfers and federal restrictions. Past FlyAway service failed due to low ridership. Grand jury recommends studying new shuttles from five OC sites.

Orange County Stops Herbicide Use in Two Local Creeks as Residents Raise Concerns

Orange County halted herbicide use in San Juan and Trabuco creeks for a year-long pilot, switching to mechanical methods after resident concerns about ecosystem damage. The decision follows a town hall and petition by Creek Team OC. The county will assess costs and effectiveness for potential expansion.

Expansion of County Landfill Turns Into Hot Button Campaign Issue

Supervisor Katrina Foley sought to halt a trash intake increase in 2026 due to resident complaints about noise and air quality near San Juan Capistrano. The Prima Deshecha landfill project has become a campaign issue and is still pending.

Officials Report Progress on Veterans Cemetery with \$10 Million Funding

The Gypsum Canyon veterans cemetery secured \$10 million in federal funding, totaling \$65 million for the \$126 million phase. A state feasibility study is expected by May 2026. Construction could start after approvals.

County Demolishes Unfinished Vietnam War Memorial Mired in Corruption Scandal

Orange County demolished an unfinished Vietnam War memorial in Mile Square Park, Fountain Valley, after \$1 million was allocated by former Supervisor Andrew Do to the Viet America Society in 2023. The project was stalled by Do's bribery conviction and indictments against nonprofit leader Peter Pham.

COSTA MESA AND NEWPORT BEACH UPDATES

Costa Mesa Regulates Self-Checkout Lanes

Costa Mesa became the second California city to regulate self-checkout lanes in large grocery and drug stores, requiring one employee per three stations, a 15-item limit, and no locked-item purchases to curb theft and protect jobs. The ordinance applies to stores over 15,000 square feet with a 60-day compliance period and fines up to \$1,000 daily. It includes a one-year review to assess impacts on businesses and consumers.



Costa Mesa Considers Rental Tracking and Evictions

The Costa Mesa City Council is debating a rental registry for 24,000 units to track evictions, rates, and vacancies, with a \$321,000 annual cost and a \$19 per unit fee. The proposal expands tenant protections to report contested evictions, aiding enforcement.

Anduril Raises \$4 Billion in Funding Round

Costa Mesa-based Anduril Industries secured \$4 billion in funding led by Thrive Capital and Andreessen Horowitz, potentially valuing the defense tech firm at \$60 billion. The round supports expansion, including a Long Beach campus and an Ohio drone factory, with projected \$2 billion revenue.

New Balboa Island Ferries to be Battery-Powered

The Balboa Island Ferry is replacing its three diesel vessels with battery-electric models, funded by over \$10 million from public agencies, with construction details pending and a potential new ferry by year-end. The new ferries will retain the existing docks and aesthetic, including "smokestacks," to maintain the historic look while reducing emissions.

Newport Beach Bans Most Tents at Coastline

Newport Beach adopted rules restricting beach shade structures to 6 feet maximum, banning linked EZ Ups, and requiring 50 feet from lifeguard towers due to safety issues from large gatherings and violations. The ordinance imposes penalties on short-term rental operators for guest breaches, including license suspensions.

Newport Beach Studies Housing Village Near JWA

Newport Beach hired Kimley-Horn for \$610,000 to plan a mixed-use village near John Wayne Airport, integrating 4,845 residential units (773 affordable) with parks, retail, and amenities over two years. The site, bounded by Campus Drive, Jamboree Road, and Bristol Street, builds on general plan updates to meet state housing mandates.

Newport Beach Police Station Plans Face Pushback

Newport Beach leaders plan a new police station at Civic Center Park, demolishing 3-4 acres of sculpture garden at a cost of \$162 million, to replace the outdated 1973 facility and improve response times. The shift from the Dove Street site followed closed-door discussions, sparking resident opposition over transparency, costs, and green space loss. Council deferred final decision, directing staff to study options and host public discussions.

Newport Beach Prepares Ocean Piers for Visitors

Newport Beach began biennial repairs on Balboa and Newport piers, replacing piles, fixing frames, and installing protective jackets at \$717,000 cost. Inspections using drones identify annual needs due to sea damage.



Twin Condo Towers to Replace Newport Movie Theater

Newport Beach approved twin 22-story condo towers to replace the Regal Edwards Big Newport theater, featuring 150 luxury units, penthouses, pools, and retail at a 4-acre site near Fashion Island. Developed by Related California, the project faces appeals over cultural impacts. Demolition could start by the end of 2026.

OTHER CITY UPDATES

Anaheim Reveals Details of 5,000-Seat Concert Hall Opening in 2027

OCVibe entertainment district in Anaheim unveiled plans for a 5,000-seat concert hall set to open in 2027, featuring a curved roof, outdoor patios, and multiple bars. The venue aims to attract mid-sized acts and includes VIP areas. It is part of a \$4 billion project surrounding the Honda Center.

Anaheim Considers Self-Checkout Rules

Anaheim City Council is considering regulating self-checkout lanes in large stores, requiring staffed stations and item limits to reduce theft. The proposal follows Costa Mesa's similar ordinance. A vote is expected in April.

Key Figure in Anaheim Corruption Scandal Attempts to Backtrack Guilty Plea

Todd Ament, former Anaheim Chamber of Commerce CEO, sought to withdraw his 2022 guilty plea to wire fraud and false tax return, claiming bad legal advice. The judge denied the request, upholding the plea amid the FBI corruption probe.

What's in Store for Angel Stadium

Anaheim officials are exploring options for Angel Stadium, including repairs or redevelopment, after a walkway collapse. Staff will report back in April with recommendations. The Angels' lease ends in 2029, with extension options to 2038.

Cypress Grapples with Who Can Speak for the City

Cypress City Council debated who can represent the city publicly, limiting statements to the city manager or mayor unless authorized. The discussion arose from a council member's unauthorized comments. The policy aims to ensure consistent messaging.

Huntington Beach Housing Plan Lawsuit Appeal Denied by Supreme Court

The U.S. Supreme Court denied Huntington Beach's appeal on its housing plan lawsuit against state mandates. The city must comply with requirements for 13,368 units. Officials plan to challenge the ruling further.



Great Park Revenue Concerns in Irvine

Irvine officials raised concerns over Great Park revenue shortfalls, with only \$1.6 million collected against a \$4 million budget. The gap stems from delayed projects like the amphitheater. The council is reviewing management and funding.

USMNT Selects Irvine's Great Park as Base Camp for FIFA World Cup

The U.S. Men's National Team chose Irvine's Great Park as its 2026 FIFA World Cup base camp for training and preparation. The site offers fields, gyms, and accommodations. It will host matches in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Orange is the latest OC City Discussing Charter Adoption

Orange City Council is considering becoming a charter city to gain more local control over governance and finances. The move follows similar discussions in Fountain Valley and Anaheim. A vote on placing it on the ballot is pending.

Court Strips Housing Authority in Santa Ana

A court ruling stripped the Orange County Housing Authority of control over Santa Ana's public housing, transferring oversight to the city. The decision follows disputes over management and funding. Santa Ana will now handle 3,000 vouchers and properties.

Immigrant Aid Efforts Expand Again in Orange County

The Irvine City Council approved \$100,000 for a fund to connect immigrant families with lawyers for deportation defense. Anaheim Councilman Carlos Leon proposed replenishing the Anaheim Contigo fund and adding legal support. These efforts respond to ICE activities in Santa Ana and Irvine, following similar funds in Santa Ana, Costa Mesa, and countywide.

OC Cities Jump on Bandwagon to Ban Kratom

Dana Point and Garden Grove pursued bans on kratom sales, following the county's restrictions on synthetic forms and sales to minors. Kratom is listed as a drug of concern by the DEA for side effects like nausea and hallucinations.

Orange County Cities Grapple With Rising Rents & Tracking Evictions

Anaheim and Costa Mesa are addressing rising rents and evictions amid deportation fears, with Anaheim considering enforcing state rent caps and no-cause eviction protections. Costa Mesa debated a rental registry to track 24,000 units and contested evictions, costing \$321,000 annually with a \$19 per unit fee. Santa Ana banned rent-pricing algorithms, building on its rent control.



SPECIAL DISTRICT UPDATES

Orange County Water District Reports Endangered Bird Recovery Success

OCWD reported continued success in endangered bird recovery at Prado Basin, with over 200 vireo nests and improved habitat. A March 10 release highlighted a joint effort with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to increase water supply through Prado Dam operations.

Santa Margarita Water District Completes Groundwater Plant Upgrade

SMWD completed major upgrades to the San Juan Capistrano Groundwater Recovery Plant, doubling capacity to 5 million gallons daily for local supply. The district secured \$1.7 million in federal grants for resilience projects.

MESA WATER CUSTOMER UPDATES

South Coast Plaza Welcomes Luxury Bed Maker Hästens

Sweden-based Hästens opened a 2,500-square-foot luxury bed showroom at South Coast Plaza on Level 2 in the Crate & Barrel wing, featuring a private "Sleep Spa" for bed testing, a custom design studio, Nordic furniture, and accessories.

South Coast Plaza Appoints New Executive Director of Marketing

South Coast Plaza appointed Tenley Zinke as Executive Director of Marketing in February 2026, succeeding Debra Gunn Downing. The center welcomed the Year of the Horse with exhibits, promotions, and activities from February 12 to March 1, including a mechanical horse centerpiece. New stores like Hästens (luxury beds) opened in March.

John Wayne Airport Passenger Traffic Increases in January 2026

John Wayne Airport served 841,879 passengers in January 2026, up 3.4% from January 2025, with commercial operations up 1.2% and commuter flights up 30.4%. Total aircraft operations jumped 36% to 33,073 in January. Infrastructure upgrades continue to support growth.

OC Fair and Event Center Wins 22 Industry Awards

The OC Fair & Event Center won 22 Achievement Awards from the Western Fairs Association, including 21 first-place honors for 2025 programming and marketing. The 2026 theme "Your Adventure Awaits!" was announced, with tickets on sale in April. Martha Sanchez Cannady was appointed to the OC Fair Board.

Seegerstrom Center for the Arts Announces 2025-26 Broadway Season

Seegerstrom Center announced its 2025-26 Broadway season, featuring "The Wiz" (January 13-25, 2026), "The Notebook" (January 27-February 8), "Monty Python's Spamalot" (February 17-22), and "SIX" (March 10-15). The center hosted "Dancing with the Stars: Live!" in April. Community events included free Lunar New Year celebrations.



POLITICAL UPDATES

Supply Chain Disruptions from Iran War

An editorial warned of potential supply chain disruptions in California due to the U.S.-Iran conflict, affecting OC ports, shipping routes, and goods availability. Escalating tensions could lead to higher costs for imports like electronics and oil, with calls for state preparedness measures.

In California's Governor Race, Democratic Candidates Press On

Democratic candidates for 2026 governor, including Katie Porter and Tom Steyer, continued campaigns despite party chair pleas for some to exit and consolidate support. The field remains crowded, with affordability, homelessness, and climate as key issues amid Republican leads in polls.

State Initiatives Will Fuel Fiery November Election

California's November 2026 ballot will feature initiatives on housing, taxes, criminal justice, and abortion rights, intensifying debates. Propositions could reshape local policies in OC, with high voter turnout expected.

Orange County's Congressional Seats Changing in 2026

Filing closed for OC's eight congressional districts under new Prop 50 maps, with key races like the 40th pitting incumbents Ken Calvert and Young Kim against Democrats. Other seats see crowded fields focusing on the economy and immigration.

California Budget Needs \$400 Million for Prop 36 Treatment

Lawmakers proposed \$400 million in the state budget for Prop 36 drug treatment programs, addressing implementation gaps in county enforcement and mental health support.
