Reservoirs 1 and 2 Pump Station Upgrades Project

File No.: M21-210B2

Description: The Reservoir Upgrades Project has several components to increase the efficiency and reliability of Reservoirs 1 and 2: Chemical storage and feed systems (sodium hypochlorite and aqueous ammonia) to help reduce nitrification issues in the distribution system; Pump replacement and conversion of drivers from gas engines to electrical motors; Upgrades to reservoir electrical service through SCE; Installation of diesel generator systems to power the reservoirs in the event of an emergency; Miscellaneous system rehabilitation and upgrades including electrical gear replacement, pipeline rehabilitation, pipeline modifications, and instrument replacement based on the results of site visits and related analyses; and Slurry Dewatering Pit upgrades located at the Reservoir 1 site.

Status: Following the approval of the recommendations of the Water, Power, and Supply Chain Reliability Assessment, Mesa Water developed a design Scope of Work for the Reservoirs 1 and 2 Upgrades Project. A proposal was solicited from a CIPR on-call design consultant and the project's Preliminary and Final Design was kicked off in May 2021. The consultant delivered a draft version of Technical Memorandum No.1 – Reservoir 1 Site Master Plan and the draft Permit Plan in July 2021. Following Mesa Water's review of TM1 and the Permit Plan, the consultant began work on the Preliminary Design Report. The Preliminary Design Report was delivered in November 2021 and the Preliminary Design Report Workshop was held in September 2021. In March 2023, the Final Bid documents and cost estimate were received and reviewed by staff. After receiving approval for the project's reduced scope, the project team began modifying the Bid Documents. The revised Bid Documents were received in August 2023. Request for Bids were released to the prequalified contractors in August 2023. A job walk was conducted in August 2023 and attended by five prequalified contractors. The bid opening was held in October 2023. Four bids were received. A recommendation for contract time extension negotiation and award was approved November 2023. The contract time extension negotiation to accommodate equipment lead times was completed and Notice to Proceed was provided January 2024. A preconstruction meeting and a site walk with the contractor team were held February 2024. The construction team mobilized at Reservoir 2 in June 2024 and Reservoir 1 in October 2024. The contractor installed and started new mixers in Reservoir 2 in August 2024. At Reservoir 2, the contractor poured and coated the concrete foundation for the Reservoir chemical facility and is constructing yard piping and electrical. At Reservoir 1, the contractor has demolished yard structures, excavated for the new

Heavy Equipment Port, Slurry Dewatering Pit, Chemical Facility, and Generator Pads. The Slurry Dewatering Pit is nearing completion and expected to be operational at the end of March 2025. After a rain delay, concrete foundation pours for the Heavy Equipment Port and Chemical Facility are scheduled for March 24, 2025. The AQMD Permit to Construct and Operate the diesel back up generators was received on March 4, 2025. Concrete for the generator pads is planned for April 2, 2025.

Capital Improvement Program Update

File No.: M24-104

Description: Develop a prioritized 10- year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) for water system improvements, including an updated supply and demand analysis, calibration of the hydraulic model, District-wide asset condition assessment, and development of a roadmap for Asset Management Program implementation.

Status: A contract was awarded to Carollo Engineers in May 2024. Technical Memo (TM) 1 Demands and TM 2 Supply were received in October 2024 and were reviewed by Staff ahead of the Workshop on October 21, 2024. Revised TM 1 and TM 2 are expected by the end of Calendar Year 2024. Staff provided pressure logger data and production data for the Hydraulic Model calibration in August 2024. Carollo's team performed asset condition assessment field work in August and September 2024. The Hydraulic Model TM was received in December 2024, and the workshop to review the TM was held on December 17, 2024. Staff provided addition data to the Carollo team to improve the hydraulic model calibration. A workshop to define the Asset Management Software Requirements was held in October 2024. Asset Management Software demonstrations were held in November and December 2024. TM 5 Regulatory Requirements was received in October 2024 was reviewed by staff. A workshop to define the asset Consequence of Failure was held in January 2025. TM 3 Transmission Systems Evaluation was received in January 2025 and was reviewed by staff. TM 9 Condition Assessment was received in January 2025 and reviewed by staff. Draft TM 10 Capital Improvement Program (CIP) was received in March 2025 and is being reviewed by staff

Local groundwater Supply Improvement Project (Local SIP)

File No.: M24-105

Description: The Local SIP will develop a feasibility study that meets the requirements of the Bureau of Reclamation's Feasibility Study Directives and Standards (WTR 11-01) for a brackish groundwater desalination facility. The project is being conducted in partnership and cost sharing with OCWD, City of Huntington Beach, and City of Newport Beach.

Status: A contract was awarded to Black & Veatch Corporation in May 2024. The project team has completed the evaluation of aquifer zones and selected three areas on which to focus the feasibility study: the Huntington Beach Mesa, Newport Mesa, and the Talbert Gap. The project team completed modeling potential wellfield locations and is currently developing treatment plant footprints and configurations for the estimated water quality. Additionally, the team is evaluating potential treatment plant locations and developing Class V level cost estimates.

Interagency Water Transfers

File No.: M25-101

Description: Conduct a feasibility study to determine if Mesa Water can reliably serve groundwater to the City of Huntington Beach.

Status: A Cooperative Agreement was executed with the City of Huntington Beach in October 2024. Staff is currently working with the City of Huntington Beach to finalize the scope of work and the Request for Proposal (RFP) requirements.

Plan Check Management System

Description: Develop a Request for Proposal for a new Plan Check system.

Status: Staff is contacting various consulting companies and vendors to discuss and analyze available electronic Plan Check systems to develop a scope of work for the preliminary project phase.

Pipeline Integrity Program

File No.: M25-103

Description: Implement Resolution No. 1525 Replacement of Assets.

Status: Since its inception in 2015, the Pipeline Integrity Program has been implemented by staff to use pipeline condition, rather than pipeline age, to prioritize pipeline replacements. The current and previous fiscal year's progress is described in this report. In Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24), the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant reviewed mainline break data from FY22 and FY23 and recommended condition assessment for pipeline groups with break thresholds that exceed the standards of Resolution No. 1525. These recommendations were presented to the Board in September 2023. Based on the recommendations, Staff negotiated a proposal for ePulse condition assessment of 2.2 miles of AC pipe. The field work was completed in May 2024 and the report was received in July 2024. The results of the condition assessment were reviewed by the Pipeline Integrity Program Consultant. The consultant's report was received in October 2024 was reviewed by staff. No AC pipelines were recommended in the report. Additionally, MWDOC staff performed 100 miles of Leak Detection in May and June 2024. The final leak detection report was received in June 2024 and no mainline leaks were reported. Staff is evaluating the feasibility of a condition assessment technology for small diameter metal pipelines, and has requested a proposal from a vendor. The contract for small diameter pipeline condition assessment was approved at the March 12, 2025 Board meeting. Staff sent ten AC pipe samples collected in conjunction with routine work for wall thickness measurement in February 2025. The report is expected in April 2025. Staff has engaged MWDOC to begin the next 100 miles of leak detection in March 2024. Staff is also investigating adding permanent pressure transient monitoring at the pump stations and other strategic locations in the distribution systems.

Mesa Water Education Center Flagpole

File No.: M25-104

Description: Evaluate the most appropriate location and height of the flagpole at the MWRF. Then execute the construction of the selected flagpole.

Status: Staff received a draft report regarding the installation of a flagpole at the Mesa Water Education Center in December 2024. Staff has reviewed the draft report and is developing recommendations to be presented at a future Board Meeting.

DISCUSSION

This item has been agendaized at the request of the Board. Resolution No. 1570 states, "any item, which has previously been reviewed, discussed, and acted upon by the Board, by way of motion, resolution, ordinance, or assigned and completed by staff shall not appear on the agenda for a Board meeting for reconsideration for the period of one year, unless the Executive Committee places such items on an agenda or such items are placed on an agenda by action of a majority of the Board."

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) holds regular Board meetings on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month at 4:30 p.m. in the Boardroom at the District Offices at 1965 Placentia Avenue, Costa Mesa. All Mesa Water Board and Committee meetings are open to the public and are conducted in accordance with Federal and State law. Mesa Water audio records their Board meetings for purposes of proper minute documentation; Mesa Water does not currently livestream or video their Board meetings.

Mesa Water received the Special District Leadership Foundation's (SDLF) District Transparency Certificate of Excellence in recognition of its outstanding efforts to promote transparency and good governance. This is the fifth time Mesa Water has received this certificate. Mesa Water was also re-accredited for the eighth time by SDLF as a "District of Distinction" for its sound fiscal management policies and practices in District operations.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Goal #3: Be financially responsible and transparent.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION

At its October 12, 2004, meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) adopted Resolution No. 1307, Establishing a Policy to Solicit Proposals for Outside Auditing Services Superseding Resolution No. 1226. Under Resolution No. 1307, at the discretion of the Board and upon conclusion of the initial three-year term, the Board may authorize up to two additional one-year renewals with the current firm. In addition, the policy imposed a limit of five consecutive annual audits by the same firm.

In April 2011, Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) issued a financial audit Request for Proposals (RFP) and received proposals from three firms: Diehl Evans & Company, Mayer Hoffman McCann, and Lance, Soll & Lunghard. The Board selected Mayer Hoffman McCann (now Davis Farr) to perform annual financial audits from Fiscal Year (FY) 2011 to FY 2013 with options to renew for FY 2014 and FY 2015, which were exercised. Davis Farr completed five financial audits; the cost of the final year's financial audit was \$25,700.

At its March 21, 2016 meeting, the Finance Committee reviewed Professional Auditing Services proposals from four firms and directed staff to agendaize Financial Auditor Selection at the next Board Meeting.

At its April 14, 2016 meeting, the Board awarded a contract to White Nelson Diehl Evans LLP (WNDE) to perform annual financial audit services for fiscal years ending June 30, 2016, June 30, 2017 and June 30, 2018 with two optional one-year extensions.

At its April 18, 2016 workshop, the Board directed staff to agendaize Financial Auditor Selection at a future Board meeting to reconsider the approved motion from the April 14, 2016 meeting.

At its May 19, 2016 meeting, the Board deferred Financial Auditor Selection to a future Finance Committee for further discussion.

At its June 20, 2016 meeting, the Finance Committee approved the scope of work within the existing Professional Auditing Services RFPs, developed a scope of work and budget to conduct a Fraud Audit, and awarded a contract to WNDE to perform annual financial audit services for fiscal



years ending June 30, 2016, June 30, 2017 and June 30, 2018 with two optional one-year extensions.

At its June 8, 2017 meeting, the Board adopted Resolution No. 1501 Establishing a Policy for the Selection Process for the Appointment of General Legal Counsel and Independent Auditor, Superseding Resolution No. 1307.

At its April 11, 2019 meeting, the Board approved two additional one-year renewals with WNDE to perform annual financial audit services for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2019 and June 30, 2020.

At its April 8, 2021 meeting, the Board approved a one-year contract extension, due to COVID-19 protocols, to CliftonLarsonAllen (formerly WNDE) to perform annual financial audit services for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

At its January 25, 2022 Committee meeting, the Board received an information item on the Financial Auditor Selection.

At its February 22, 2022 Committee meeting, the Board directed staff to omit the interviews scheduled for March 8, 2022 and awarded a three-year contract with Lance, Soll & Lunghard, LLP in the amount of \$136,650 to perform Financial Auditing Services.

DISCUSSION

Lance, Soll & Lunghard, LLP (LSL) has completed the last three annual financial audits and prepared the Annual Financial Report (AFR) for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022, June 30, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

In accordance with Resolution No. 1501, the Board may authorize up to two additional one-year renewals with LSL or direct staff to solicit Request for Proposals for an Independent Auditor. The table below shows the maximum fees for the two fiscal years ending June 30, 2025 and June 30, 2026:

Over the past three years, LSL has provided exceptional financial auditing services to Mesa Water. Their team has been highly professional, responsive and accommodating, ensuring a smooth and efficient audit process. The finance team experienced no issues working with LSL, as they consistently demonstrated expertise and a collaborative approach. LSL completed the annual audits and AFR on time, consistently meeting Mesa Water's deadlines. Given their reliability and strong working relationship, staff would like to maintain this successful partnership.

Staff recommends that the Board approve a contract extension with LSL to perform annual Financial Auditing Services for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2025 and June 30, 2026.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2025, \$45,500 is budgeted for Auditing Services; \$36,300 has been spent to date.

In Fiscal Years 2026 and 2027, \$50,500 will be budgeted in each of the proposed budgets for Auditing Services.

PRIOR BOARD ACTION/DISCUSSION

At its July 8, 2021 meeting, the Board of Directors (Board) approved a one-year contract, with options for renewal, to Westbound Communications for \$105,000 to provide digital and social media strategy and content development services.

At its August 10, 2022 meeting, the Board approved a one-year contract renewal with Westbound Communications for \$145,000 to provide digital and social media strategy content development, and community management services.

On June 8, 2023, under the General Manager's COVID signing authority, an amendment for \$145,000 was executed to exercise an extension available.

At its July 10, 2024 meeting, the Board approved a six-month contract extension with Westbound Communications for \$60,000 to continue to provide digital and social media strategy content development, and community management services.

At its December 11, 2024 meeting, the Board approved a three-month contract extension with Westbound Communications for \$30,000 to continue to provide digital and social media strategy content development, and community management services.

BACKGROUND

Mesa Water District (Mesa Water®) has supplemented staff efforts with social media consulting services from a number of agencies since 2016. In 2021, Mesa Water went through a Request for Proposal (RFP) process and selected Westbound Communications (Westbound) to provide digital and social media strategy, content development and community management services.

Westbound Communications began working with Mesa Water in July 2021. The initial contract was for one year with options to renew for three additional one-year periods.



DISCUSSION

At the May 24, 2023 Board meeting, Westbound presented the results of its Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 social media campaign and recommendations for the District's FY 2024 social media program.

Westbound was successful in helping Mesa Water exceed its FY 2024 measurable objectives for reach, engagement and Costa Mesa followers through strategic paid ad campaigns, with engagement and costs per click results surpassing industry standards. In FY 2024, Westbound also produced increased video content for Mesa Water's social media channels. After focusing primarily on growing Facebook followers in the service area since FY 2022, with guidance from Westbound, two new pilot campaigns were launched in FY 2025 on Instagram and YouTube aimed at reaching customers in new ways. These new campaigns focused on increasing brand and local water awareness through reach and engagement and garnered strong results.

As this will be the final year of the Westbound contract, an RFP for digital and social media strategy, content development and community management services will be issued in late FY 2025.

Staff recommends that the Board approve a final three-month contract with Westbound Communications for \$30,000 to provide Social Media Consulting Services that include, but are not limited to, digital and social media strategy, content development and community management services. The contract amount includes funds for short-form video creation and paid campaigns to continue to achieve reach and engagement objectives.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

In Fiscal Year 2025, \$1,047,550 is budgeted for Public Affairs Support Services; \$411,365 has been spent to date.

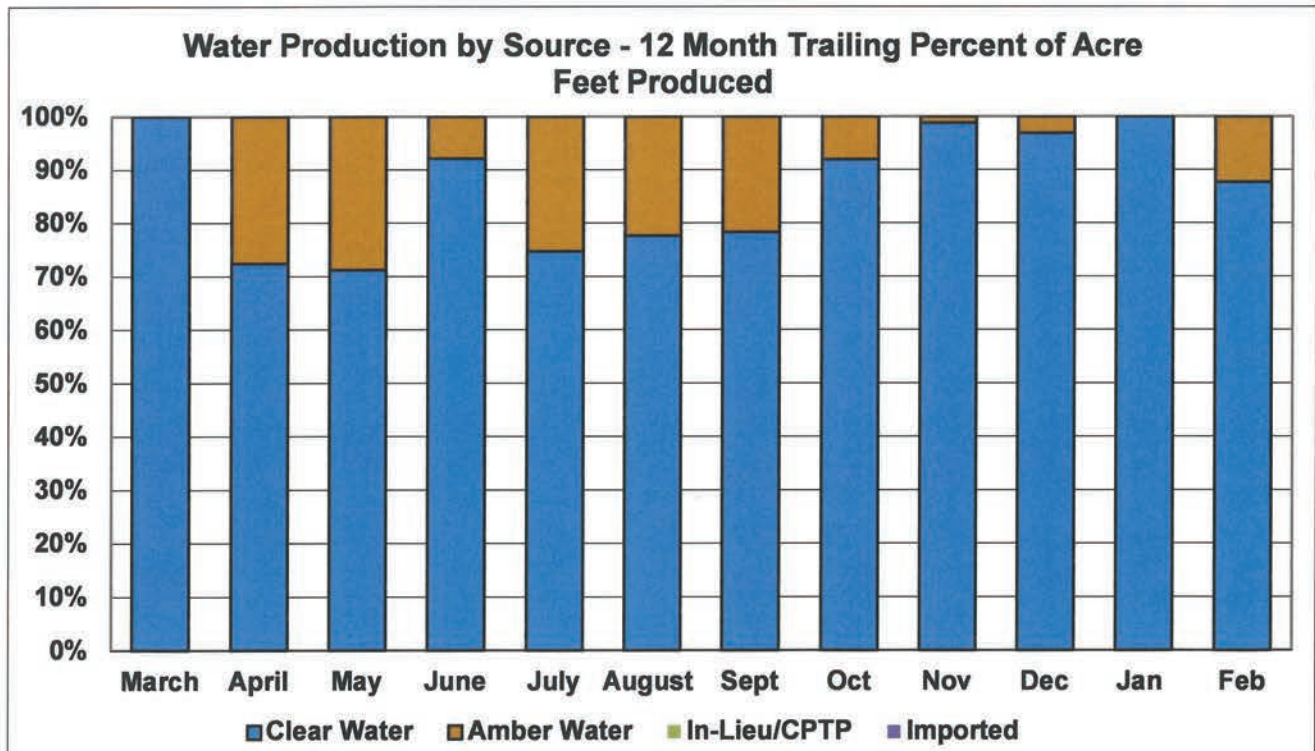

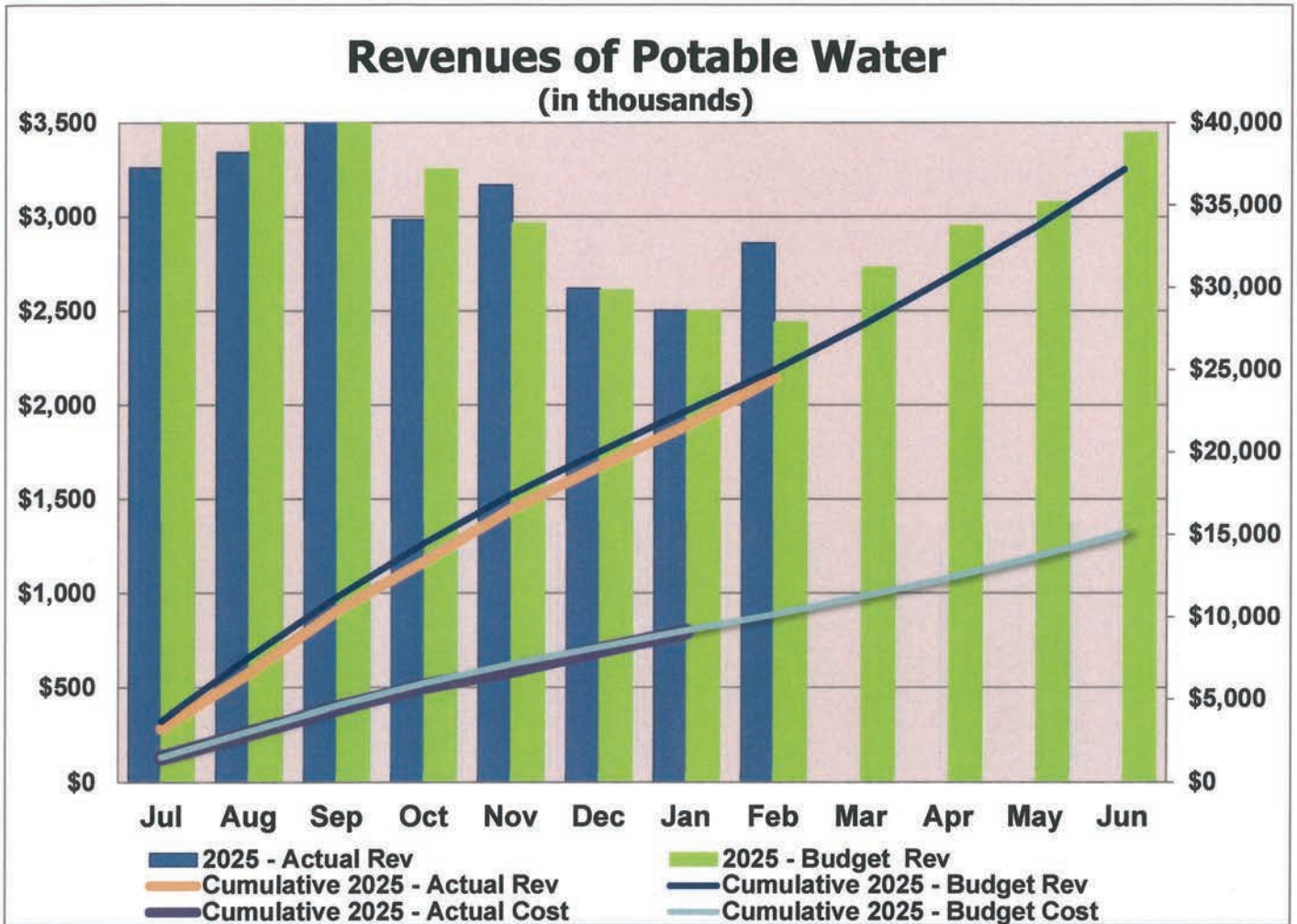

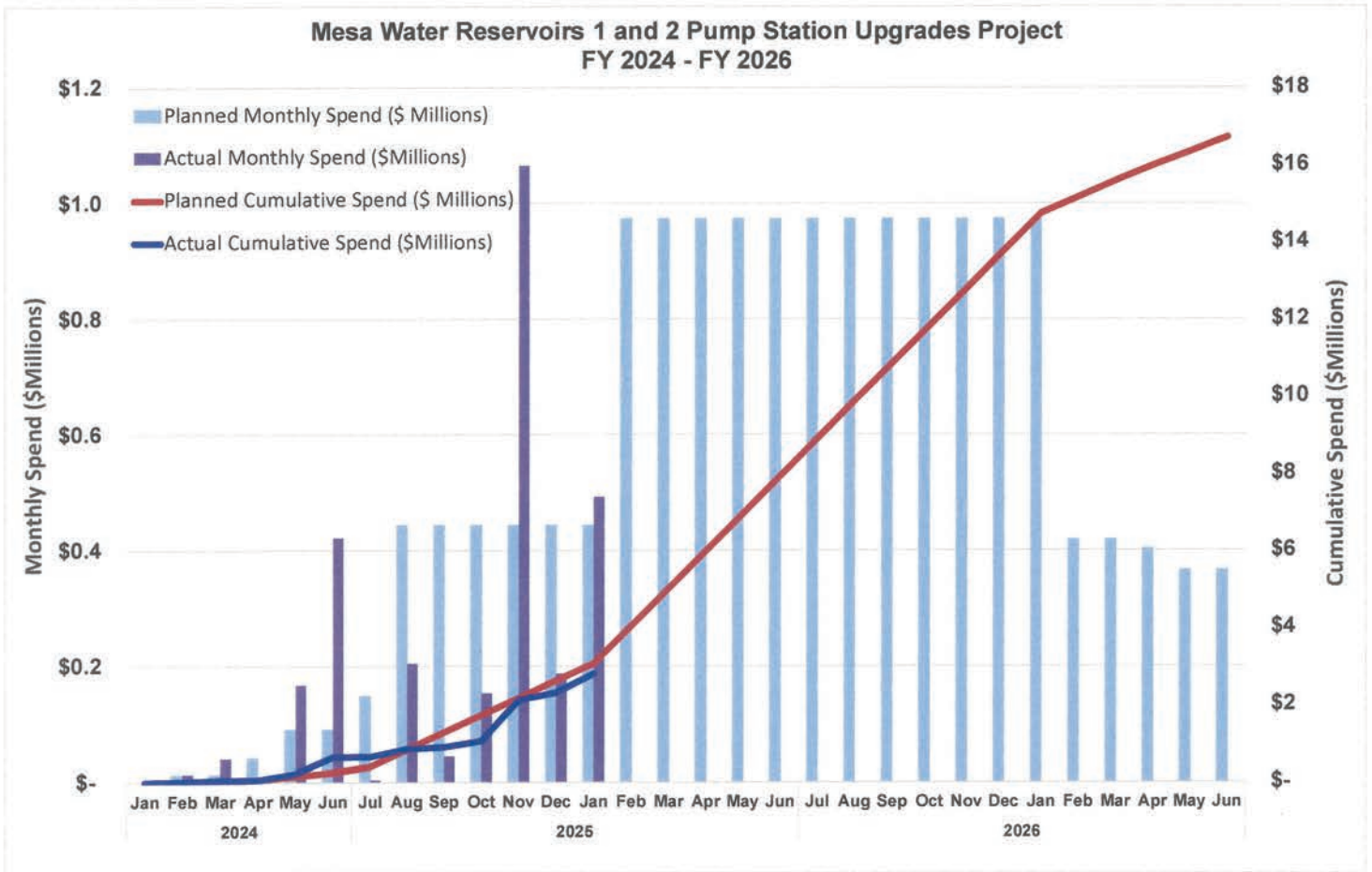

Appropriations Update

On Saturday, March 15th, [H.R.1968](#) was signed by President Trump to avoid a partial federal shutdown and continue to fund the government until September 30th, through the remainder of FY 2025. The continuing resolution maintains the funding levels from FY 2024, with a few exceptions. The legislation decreases non-defense spending by about \$13 billion and increases defense spending by about \$6 billion in comparison to the FY 2024 budget. Project-specific funding was not included in the continuing resolution and will be largely left to the discretion of the federal agencies.

Federal Judge Rules Fired Federal Workers Must Be Rehired Immediately

On March 13th, U.S. District Judge William Alsup ordered federal agencies to rehire all probationary employees who were recently fired during the Administration's actions to reduce the federal workforce. Alsup stated the firings were "unlawful" as they did not follow proper legal requirements, stating the Administration attempted to circumvent federal laws on reducing the workforce by attributing the firings to "performance" when that may not have been the case. Alsup, a San Francisco-based appointee of President Bill Clinton, ordered the Defense, Treasury, Energy, Interior, Agriculture and Veterans Affairs departments to "immediately" offer all fired probationary employees their jobs back. The agencies still have the authority to implement "reductions in force," as long as they follow the proper procedures for doing so. The ruling was issued in a lawsuit brought by federal employee unions along with non-profit groups that said their work would be negatively impacted by the firings in places like national parks and veterans' hospitals.

Tom Schultz Announced as Chief of USDA Forest Service

On February 27th, the Secretary of the U.S. Department Agriculture (USDA), Brooke Rollins, announced Tom Schultz to serve as the Chief of the USDA Forest Service. Schultz will replace Chief Randy Moore after he worked for the agency for over 40 years. The new chief's goals are to "support and protect our rural communities, increase opportunities for outdoor recreation, and suppress wildfires with all available resources emphasizing safety and the importance of protecting resource values." Previously serving as the vice president of resources and government affairs at an Idaho forest group, as a US Air Force officer, as the director of the Idaho Department of Lands, and working for the Montana Department of Natural Resources and Conservation, Schultz has a broad background in working around natural resources.

“Midnight Rules Relief Act” Passes House

On January 3rd, Representative Andy Biggs (R-AZ) introduced [H.R. 77](#), the Midnight Rules Relief Act. On February 12th, it passed the House with a vote of 212 - 208. If passed, the bill will allow Congress to disapprove multiple regulations under one joint resolution of disapproval if the regulations were submitted for review during a portion of the final year of a President's term. Biggs states the bill was introduced with a goal to “reign in unelected bureaucrats” after previous Administrations issued questionable or otherwise controversial rulemakings and “imposed more than \$1.34 trillion in regulations in 2024 alone.”

Rep. Gluesenkamp Introduces PFAS Liability Protection Act

On February 12th, Representative Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA) introduced [H.R.1267](#) to exempt certain entities from liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 with respect to releases of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS). This reintroduction of the PFAS Liability Protection Act will provide statutory protections for water and wastewater utilities that may otherwise face financial liability as a result of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) designation of perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFOS) as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA). The CEO of the American Water Works Association (AWWA), David LaFrance, stated “The Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act will ensure that polluters are held responsible for cleaning up the PFAS they introduced into the environment, rather than water utilities and their ratepayers.”

California Summer Water Delivery Forecasts

After a series of snowstorms in February increased snowpack levels, major reservoirs are slightly above average, which may increase availability of summer water supply. As a response, federal and State water officials expect to deliver about 35% of requested water to cities and farmers, which is approximately twice the initial estimate at this time last year. The San Joaquin Basin remains critically dry, though, limiting the overall allocation. The final allocation forecast is expected to be announced in April.

Colorado River Board of California Warn Administration Against Staff Cuts at Reclamation

As the Administration has been reducing federal agency staff, on February 27th major California water managers reliant on flows from the Colorado River urged the White House to hold back on staff reductions at the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR), warning that "across-the-board cuts" could put at risk both water and power deliveries. The Colorado River Board of California (Board) outlined its concerns in a [letter](#) the Board sent to Interior Secretary Doug Burgum. The Board's letter stated Reclamation staff reductions could imperil the Administration's agenda to increase water supplies, as well as the agency's basic contracts to deliver water to its paying customers.

Currently, the California regional office of BOR has lost about 10% of its staff as a result of buyouts and staff reductions. VSA will keep Mesa Water updated as more information becomes available.

Federal Funding Impoundment Includes Lower Colorado River System Conservation Program

The Lower Colorado River System Conservation and Efficiency Program, a program established by Congress through the 2022 Inflation Reduction Act to help raise the elevation of Lake Mead has been paused by Executive Order #14154, [Unleashing American Energy](#). The order requires “all agencies to immediately pause the disbursement of funds appropriated through the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 or the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.” The pause in funding has occurred amidst negotiations amongst the Colorado River region States over the long-term operational and conservation guidelines for the river. Reclamation’s current Colorado River interim rules, set in 2007, will expire at the end of 2026.

In response to this development, six Senators from Western States, led by Senator Alex Padilla, wrote a [letter](#) to Interior Secretary Burgum on March 3rd urging the Department of the Interior curtail the funding freeze as it could endanger the flow of the Colorado River. The program, the Senators explained, has been vital “in increasing water conservation, improving efficiency, and preventing the Colorado River system’s reservoirs from reaching dangerously low levels that threaten water deliveries and power production.” The Senators characterized the need for water in the Colorado River basin as “more urgent than ever,” warning that this year’s weather forecast projects a below-average supply.

Potential Impact on Water Projects Following EPA Reorganization

The recent terminations of 388 employees working for the EPA may have the potential to delay funding for drinking water and sewage treatment projects. Luke Wright, formerly an employee in the EPA’s Southeastern office, said “it’s just going to be super-slow getting the money to communities without the manpower to work with them.” Some projects that could be affected include those “addressing PFAS, stopping sewer backups in people’s homes, and modernizing aging infrastructure,” said Zachary Schafer, the former director of policy at EPA in the Office of Water under the Biden administration. Joshua Alexander, in the EPA Region 9 public affairs department, gave examples of several EPA regional offices in which less than 10 full time employees are managing between 62 and 310 grants and projects. None of the offices, though, commented on whether the water grants teams were among those affected by the recent terminations.

EPA Administrator Plans to Modify WOTUS Under CWA

The EPA Administrator, Lee Zeldin, has announced plans to issue a new [rule](#) regarding the Waters of the United States (WOTUS), in tandem with the United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). The rule will redefine what counts as a “water of the U.S.” and subject to federal Clean Water Act standards, a topic that has been debated for decades. As industry groups, landowners, and farmers have expressed concerns regarding previous regulations of many isolated streams and wetlands, the Trump Administration plans to now follow an interpretation of the *Sackett v. EPA* ruling by the Supreme Court. *Sackett v. EPA* ruled that only those waterbodies with a

continuous surface connection to traditional interstate navigable waters are covered by the federal Clean Water Act.

Praises of the new ruling include some lawmakers and industry groups feeling optimistic about the positive impacts on permitting speed. Concern from some scientists and environmental advocates has been expressed regarding the potential for an increase in pollution and flooding. The EPA and USACE will hold “at least six” listening sessions beginning in late March to gather input from stakeholders as well as state and local officials.

Petition Filed to Challenge California’s Heavy-Duty Low NOx Waiver

On March 7th, the Pacific Legal Foundation, on behalf of trucking and construction industry groups, filed a [petition](#) to challenge the EPA’s approval, under the Biden administration, of California’s Heavy-Duty Low NOx waiver. The waiver allows the State of California to enforce federal emissions standards for diesel trucks that are stronger than the federal standards. In April, the Supreme Court will hear arguments on whether there is standing to overturn the waiver, as a lower court has stated the groups lack standing because the emissions standards only apply to automakers. The trucking and construction industry groups claim they have been adversely affected by the rule, though.

The EPA and some Members of Congress are planning to use the Congressional Review Act to revoke the waiver, as well as to revoke other waivers allowing California to enforce sales mandates for electric cars and commercial trucks. The Government Accountability Office has stated the waivers are not legally allowed to be overturned by Congress as they are not considered agency rules.

SUPPORT (if/when introduced in the 119th Congress)

Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP) Establishment Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would direct the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to make permanent the Low-Income Household Assistance Water Program (LIHWAP). The bill would allow HHS to award grants to eligible entities to provide funds to public water systems to assist low-income households in paying for drinking water or wastewater services.

Water Efficiency, Conservation, and Sustainability Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would create programs at the EPA for states, municipalities, and utilities for water improvement program, a water loss control program, and a program to adopt and implement water-efficient plumbing codes.

Support to Rehydrate the Environment, Agriculture, and Municipalities Act (STREAM) Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would expedite non-federal storage projects with less than \$250 million in federal funding, water recycling, and desalination projects by allowing the Department of the Interior to approve the projects. This provision is needed following the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act's expiration in December 2021. Absent this provision, Congress must individually authorize all water recycling, desalination, and storage projects, with the exception of projects that receive construction funding under the bipartisan infrastructure legislation.

Reclamation Climate Change and Water Program Reauthorization Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Climate Change and Water Program which will expire at the end of 2023.

Desalination Research Advancement Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would reauthorize the Bureau of Reclamation's Desalination and Water Purification Research (DWPR) Program, which funds projects to improve water supply development from seawater, brackish groundwater, and wastewater.

Special District Grant Accessibility Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would require special districts to be recognized as local government and be eligible for federal funding.

WATCH (if/when introduced in the 119th Congress)

The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (Healthy H2O Act)

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill would provide grants through the U.S. Department of Agriculture for water quality testing and to purchase and install point-of-entry water filtration systems to remove contaminants from drinking water.

Clean Water Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would clarify “protected water resources” under the Clean Water Act and would reinstate protections on 50% of wetlands and 70% of rivers that lost protection under the *Sackett v. EPA Hearing*.

PFAS Accountability Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill establishes requirements and incentives to limit the use of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly referred to as PFAS, and remediate PFAS in the environment. The bill directs the EPA to designate the PFAS perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) as a hazardous substance under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980, thereby requiring remediation of releases of those PFAS into the environment.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability Act of 2023 (WATER) Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The legislation would assist communities in securing access to clean and reliable drinking water. The bill also contains provisions to combat PFAS and provide grants for low-income communities struggling with unaffordable water bills.

Water Access Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would appropriate \$500 million to LIHWAP under sec. 2912 of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, for fiscal year 2024.

Canal Conveyance Capacity Restoration Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would authorize a one-third federal cost share for restoring canal capacity. Additionally, the bill would authorize over \$833 million for restoration efforts at the Friant-Kern Canal, Delta Mendota Canal, California Aqueduct, and San Joaquin River.

Flood Prevention and Snowpack Management Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation would create a task force to monitor California snowpack and flood mitigation. The task force would be established by the Secretary of the Army, acting through the Chief of Engineers, and led by representatives in Congress and Federal agencies.

Working to Advance Tangible and Effective Reforms (WATER) for California Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would require the Central Valley Project and State Water Project promote more water deliveries to farmers under a 2019 Trump-era biological opinion. This legislation would also reauthorize the surface water storage project program and operations of the Central Valley and State Water Projects created in the WIIN Act.

Water Supply Permitting Coordination Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation would establish a framework for federal agencies that hold permitting authority to coordinate reservoir construction work and make public the construction schedules, data, and technical materials to prevent delays and create more water supply.

Water System Threat Preparedness and Resilience Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The legislation would provide funding for water utilities to join the Water Information Sharing and Analysis Center (WaterISAC) to gain access to critical information and practices to protect and mitigate cyber threats.

Restoring WIFIA Eligibility Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would amend the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act of 2014 (WIFIA) to clarify that federally-owned infrastructure projects managed by non-federal entities are eligible for WIFIA funding.

Protect Our Water Rights Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To mandate contract water deliveries of the Central Valley Project and Klamath River Basin Reclamation Project by the Bureau of Reclamation in normal precipitation years and guarantee additional water in dry years.

Water Quality and Environmental Innovation Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To authorize the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to award grants and contracts for projects that use emerging technologies to address threats to water quality.

California Water Infrastructure Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would assist in expediting U.S. Bureau of Reclamation water projects by accepting alternative environmental reviews conducted under state laws, such as the California Environmental Quality Act, in place of federal reviews under the National Environmental Policy Act.

Open Access Evapotranspiration Data Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would create a program within the Department of the Interior to share public data on estimates of evapotranspiration from satellites and weather stations with water managers

Stop the Delta Tunnel Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would prohibit the Army Corps of Engineers from issuing a federal permit necessary for the State of California to build the Delta Conveyance Project, commonly known as the Delta Tunnel.

Providing for congressional disapproval relating to "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States'"

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Department of the Army, Corps of Engineers, Department of Defense, and the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States'"

Clean Water Allotment Modernization Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to revamp the 36-year-old formula used by the federal government to allocate the clean water state revolving fund allocation among states. It would require the Environmental Protection Agency to regularly update how funding allocations are based.

Veterans Exposed to Toxic PFAS Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill provides eligibility for Department of Veterans Affairs hospital care and medical services to veterans and their family members (including those in utero) who have specified conditions and resided at a military installation where individuals were exposed to perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly known as PFAS. PFAS are manufactured and may have adverse human health effects.

Wildfire Response and Drought Resiliency Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A legislative package that includes over 40 bills that would authorize billions of dollars in federal funding for the Departments of Interior and Agriculture for implementation of forest management, water, and climate programs. It would also expand federal disaster relief assistance and research efforts on effects of wildfire on public health, and programs to improve water efficiency and conservation in tribal and low-income communities.

Controlling America's Perilous Spending (CAPS) Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would amend the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 to extend the discretionary spending limits through fiscal year 2032.

Priority for Water Supply and Conservation Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill would include water supply and water conservation as a primary mission of the Corps of Engineers in planning, designing, constructing, modifying, operating, and maintaining water resources development projects.

Clean Water SRF Parity Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to expand the state revolving fund established under the Clean Water Act, including by allowing low-interest loans to be given to privately owned treatment works to address wastewater. Currently, loans are given to wastewater systems that are publicly owned.

PFAS Action Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: To require the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency to designate per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980.

Water Affordability, Transparency, Equity, and Reliability Act of 2023

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This bill increases funding for water infrastructure to control water pollution or protected drinking water. In addition, the bill revises requirements concerning the clean water state revolving fund (SRF) and the drinking water SRF. It also creates or reauthorizes several grant programs related to water infrastructure, such as grants for removing lead from drinking water.

EMBER Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: The bill will ensure better assessment, prevention, and help for communities to manage wildfires. It focuses on modernizing wildfire policies, bolstering resilience, and enhancing restoration efforts.

Drought Resilience Infrastructure Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation will provide new resources and authorities through the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to support communities experiencing long-term drought conditions.

Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act Amendments

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: A bill to update and improve a loan program that funds critical water and wastewater infrastructure projects in Washington State

Drought Relief Obtained Using Government Help Today (DROUGHT) Act of 2024

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation will increase the federal share of Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act loans from 80 percent to 90 percent for qualified disadvantaged communities experiencing severe drought.

Help Hoover Dam Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation will preserve Hoover Dam as an affordable energy source and strengthen the Southwest's electrical grid by giving the Bureau of Reclamation the authority to use "stranded funds" currently in the Colorado River Dam Fund to pay for operation, maintenance, and replacement projects at Hoover Dam.

Large-Scale Water Recycling Reauthorization and Investment Act

Status: Has not yet been introduced in the 119th Congress.

Summary: This legislation aims to reauthorize a water recycling grant program for large-scale projects in California and other western states. The bill builds on the success of water recycling projects funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, providing additional funding opportunities to boost existing projects and initiate new ones.

SUPPORT

Water Conservation Rebate Parity Act ([H.R.1871](#)) Rep. Jared Huffman (D-CA)

Status: House - 03/05/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means.

Summary: This legislation will amend federal tax law to ensure homeowners do not have to pay income tax when they receive rebates from water utilities for water conservation and water runoff management improvements.

WATCH

Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny Act ([H.R. 142](#)) Rep. Kat Cammack (R-FL)

Status: House - 01/03/2025 Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committees on Rules, and the Budget

Summary: This bill will aim to increase accountability and transparency in the federal regulatory process by requiring that any new "major rule" proposed by federal agencies receive approval from both the House and Senate before taking effect.

To eliminate federal funding for the failed California High-Speed Rail project ([H.R. 213](#)) Rep. Kevin Kiley (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

Summary: This bill will prohibit the use of Federal financial assistance for the California High-Speed Rail development project in the State of California.

Colorado River Basin System Conservation Extension Act ([H.R. 231](#)) Rep. Harriet Hageman (R-WY)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by Unanimous Consent.

Summary: This bill will reauthorize the Colorado River System Conservation Pilot Program through fiscal year 2026.

Preserving Choice in Vehicle Purchase Act ([H.R.346](#)) Rep. John Joyce (R-PA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This bill will block the U.S. Environmental Agency from giving California a waiver to “limit the sale or use of new motor vehicles with internal combustion engines.” It would do so by modifying the waiver process under the Clean Air Act related to state emission control standards for new motor vehicles.

Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency relating to "National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI) ([H.J. Res. 18](#)) Rep. Gary Palmer (R-AL)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Summary: This joint resolution nullifies the rule titled National Primary Drinking Water Regulations for Lead and Copper: Improvements (LCRI), which was submitted by the Environmental Protection Agency on October 30, 2024.

Every Drop Counts Act ([H.R. 338](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will expand the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law's Small Storage Program by making it easier for groundwater projects to qualify for funding, increase the amount of water they can store, and stabilize underground aquifers.

Fix Our Forests Act ([H.R.471](#)) Rep. Bruce Westerman (R-AR)

Status: House – 01/23/2025 Passed in house 279 - 141

Senate - 01/28/2025 Received in the Senate.

Summary: The bill simplifies and expedites environmental reviews for forest management projects, promotes federal, state, tribal, and local collaboration, and deters frivolous litigation that delays essential projects.

Headwaters Protection Act of 2025 ([H.R.605](#)) Rep. Jim Costa (D-CA)

Status: House - 01/22/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, and in addition to the Committee on Natural Resources

Summary: The bill reauthorizes the Water Source Protection Program (WSPP) at \$30 million annually from 2024-2028, expands the list of eligible lands and entities, lowers the non-federal match requirement for smaller private sector companies, and reduces bureaucratic hurdles for existing Watershed Restoration Action Plans.

Colorado River Basin System Conservation Extension Act ([S.154](#)) Sen. John Hickenlooper (D-CO)

Status: Senate - 01/21/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will amend the Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015, to reauthorize the Colorado River System conservation pilot program.

To improve the lead time, accuracy, and dissemination of forecasts of atmospheric rivers throughout the United States ([S.322](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate – 01/29/2025 Referred to Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation

Summary: This bill will require the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to establish a forecast improvement program within the National Weather Service.

To direct the Secretary of Agriculture to select and implement landscape-scale forest restoration projects, to assist communities in increasing their resilience to wildfire ([S.350](#)) Sen. Alex Padilla (D-CA)

Status: Senate - 01/30/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Natural Resources

Summary: This bill will direct the Secretary of Agriculture to select and implement these projects, focusing on reducing the threat of destructive wildfires and assisting communities in increasing their resilience.

Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program Amendment Act of 2025 ([H.R.831](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 01/31/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish an interest-bearing account for the non-Federal contributions to the Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program. This will ensure that state contributions to conservation projects in the Lower Colorado River Basin are able to earn interest and grow before being allocated.

Emergency Wildfire Fighting Technology Act ([H.R.836](#)) Rep. David Valadao (R-CA)

Status:

Senate - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition, and Forestry.

Summary: The bill will require the U.S. Forest Service and the Department of the Interior to jointly evaluate the use of the Container Aerial Firefighting System to mitigate and suppress wildfires

To amend the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act to require the President to establish an individual household disaster mitigation program ([H.R.1105](#)) Rep. Mike Thompson (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/06/2025 Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, and in addition to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

Summary: This bill will provide homeowners in disaster-prone regions with broad incentives to harden their properties against wildfires and other risks.

Water Systems PFAS Liability Protection Act ([H.R.1267](#)) Rep. Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D-WA)

Status: House - 02/12/2025 Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure

Summary: This bill exempts specified water management entities from liability under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) for releases of certain perfluoroalkyl or polyfluoroalkyl substances, commonly referred to as PFAS.

To direct the Secretary of Commerce to establish and carry out a program to sequence the genomes of aquatic species ([H.R. 1332](#)) Rep. Dave Min (D-CA)

Status: House - 02/13/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will establish a program within the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to collect data on at-risk, aquatic species.

Midnight Rules Relief Act ([H.R.77](#)) Rep. Andy Biggs (R-AZ)

Status: Senate - 02/13/2025 Referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

Summary: This bill will allow lawmakers to roll back multiple federal regulations in one Congressional Review Act resolution, as currently CRA resolutions can only address one rule at a time.

Coastal Commission Accountability Act ([H.R. 1874](#)) Rep. Kevin Kiley (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/05/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This bill will amend the Coastal Zone Management Act (CZMA) to expedite important coastal activities, including national security initiatives, critical infrastructure development, and disaster mitigation and recovery efforts.

Federally Integrated Species Health (FISH) Act ([H.R.1894](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/06/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Summary: This legislation would eliminate the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Fisheries' oversight role in regulating salmon and other fish under the Endangered Species Act and designate the Fish and Wildlife Life Service (FWS) as the sole regulatory authority.

To amend the Federal Water Pollution Control Act with respect to permitting terms ([H.R.2093](#)) Rep. Ken Calvert (R-CA)

Status: House - 03/14/2025 Referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

Summary: This bill will extend National Pollution Discharge Elimination System permits from 5 years to 10 years.

Subject: March 2025 Monthly Report

This report covers the first few weeks of March which have proven to again be a busy time for water policy conversations. With policy committees now in full swing, legislators, lobbyists, and stakeholders are working to refine proposals, secure support, and navigate the legislative process. While many water proposals have yet to be scheduled for a hearing the legislature has heard testimony on bills related to the LA fires which continue to dominate conversations.

At the same time, budget subcommittees continue their analysis of Governor Gavin Newsom's January budget proposal, scrutinizing spending priorities and weighing potential adjustments. In the Assembly Budget Subcommittee 4, which covers water, climate, and natural resources issues, extensive scrutiny was placed on the California Air Resources Board, who proposed new sweeping fee authority while at the same time promising not to use the authority, "...without checking with the legislature first." Several legislators expressed serious concern regarding CARB's view of their own role and authority. These issues will continue to be discussed until the Governor releases his May Revision around May 10.

Key Bills

SB 496 (Hurtado-D) Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation: appeals advisory committee: exemptions

SB 496, sponsored by the California Special Districts Association, proposes the creation of the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation Appeals Advisory Committee to review appeals from businesses and government agencies whose exemption requests under the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation were denied. The committee would meet monthly, provide recommendations within 60 days of an appeal, and ensure transparency by making meeting recordings and decisions publicly available.

Additionally, the bill expands emergency vehicle exemptions, modifies daily usage exemption requirements, and removes the need for fleet owners to show a zero-emissions vehicle purchase agreement when requesting certain compliance extensions. SB 496 clarifies that vehicles expected to respond to emergencies or support disaster response efforts are exempt from the Advanced Clean Fleets Regulation to the same extent as officially designated emergency vehicles.

This bill is being supported by a number of public agency associations and water agencies. SB 496 will be heard in the Senate Committee on Environmental Quality on April 2, 2025.

SB 454 (McNerney - D) State Water Resources Control Board: PFAS Mitigation Program.

Sponsored by ACWA and Cal Cities, this bill would create the PFAS Mitigation Fund in the General Fund and would authorize the fund to be expended by the State Water Resources Control Board to issue grants and/or loans for the purpose of addressing PFAS contamination. The bill would authorize the state board to seek out and accept nonstate, federal, and private funds, require those funds to be deposited into the PFAS Reduction Account within the PFAS Mitigation Fund. This bill has been scheduled to be heard in the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on April 2, 2025 at 9am. California Advocates will be in attendance to testify in support.

SB 72 (Caballero-D) The California Water Plan: long-term supply targets.

This bill is a reintroduction of SB 366 (Caballero) from 2024. The bill would require DWR to establish an interim planning target of 9,000,000 acre-feet of additional water, water conservation, or water storage capacity to be achieved by 2040. The bill would require the target to consider the identified and future water needs for a sustainable urban sector, agricultural sector, and environment, and ensure safe drinking water for all Californians, among other things. The bill has been referred to the Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Water but has not yet been set for a hearing. The California Municipal Utilities Association is sponsoring the bill and ACWA is supporting.

Existing law requires the plan to include, among other things, a description of the method for collecting moneys to support and implement the program and a description of the method for determining the amount of moneys that may need to be collected from water ratepayers to fund the program. This bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Program. As part of the program, the bill would establish the Water Rate Assistance Fund in the State Treasury to provide water affordability assistance, for both drinking water and wastewater services, to low-income residential ratepayers, as specified. The bill would require the state board to take various actions in administering the fund, including, among other things, track and manage revenue in the fund separately from all other revenue. The bill would require the state board, in consultation with relevant agencies and after a public hearing, to adopt guidelines for implementation of the program and adopt an annual report to be posted on the state board's internet website identifying how the fund has performed, as specified. Summary: Existing law, the Ralph M. Brown Act, requires, with specified exceptions, that all meetings of a legislative body, as defined, of a local agency be open and public and that all persons be permitted to attend and participate. The act authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use teleconferencing, as specified, and requires a legislative body of a local agency that elects to use teleconferencing to comply with specified requirements, including that the local agency post agendas at all teleconference locations, identify each teleconference location in the notice and agenda of the meeting or proceeding, and have each teleconference location be accessible to the public. Existing law, until January 1, 2026, authorizes the legislative body of a local agency to use alternative teleconferencing if, during the teleconference meeting, at least a quorum of the members of the legislative body participates in person from a singular physical location clearly identified on the agenda that is open to the public and situated within the boundaries of the territory over which the local agency exercises jurisdiction, and the legislative body complies with prescribed requirements. Existing law requires a member to satisfy specified requirements to participate in a meeting remotely pursuant to these alternative teleconferencing provisions, including that specified circumstances apply. Existing law establishes limits on the number of meetings a member may participate in solely by teleconference from a remote location pursuant to these alternative teleconferencing provisions, including prohibiting such participation for more than 2 meetings per year if the legislative body regularly meets once per month or less. This bill would remove the January 1, 2026, date from those provisions, thereby extending the alternative teleconferencing procedures indefinitely. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Existing law authorizes banks to issue and sell bank credits to private and public entities. Existing law defines "conservation bank" and "mitigation bank" for these purposes. This bill would expand the definition of "conservation bank" and "mitigation bank" to include marine artificial reefs. The bill would authorize a person to, after completion of a full environmental review in compliance with applicable California and federal laws and regulations, create a marine artificial reef for purposes of establishing a mitigation or conservation bank. The bill would clarify that both nonprofit and for-profit organizations are authorized to establish and operate a conservation bank, mitigation bank, or conservation and mitigation bank. The bill would provide that if a marine artificial reef is located on state sovereign land then a lease is required from the State Lands Commission, as provided. The bill would provide that the lease from the commission would satisfy the requirements for a bank enabling instrument and for the department to grant a conservation easement.

Pursuant to the act, the state board has adopted the California Greenhouse Gas Cap-and-Trade Program to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases by applying a greenhouse gas allowance budget to specified entities and providing a trading mechanism for achieving compliance, as provided. The act requires the state board to adopt rules and regulations to achieve the maximum technologically feasible and cost-effective greenhouse gas emissions reductions to ensure that the statewide greenhouse gas emissions are reduced to at least 40% below the statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit, as defined, no later than December 31, 2030. Pursuant to the act, the state board has adopted the Low Carbon Fuel Standard regulations to reduce the carbon intensity of transportation fuels used in California, as specified. This bill would prohibit the state board from adopting any standard, regulation, or rule that affects the Low Carbon

Fuel Standard or the California Greenhouse Gas Cap-and-Trade Program until the Legislative Analyst has analyzed the cost to the consumer of the proposed standard, regulation, or rule, as specified, and submitted its analysis to the Legislature.

CEQA also requires a lead agency to prepare a mitigated negative declaration for a project that may have a significant effect on the environment if revisions in the project would avoid or mitigate that effect and there is no substantial evidence that the project, as revised, would have a significant effect on the environment. CEQA establishes a procedure by which a person may seek judicial review of the decision of the lead agency made pursuant to CEQA. The Jobs and Economic Improvement Through Environmental Leadership Act of 2021 authorizes the Governor, until January 1, 2032, to certify environmental leadership development projects that meet specified requirements for certain streamlining benefits related to CEQA. The act, among other things, requires a lead agency to prepare the record of proceedings for an environmental leadership development project, as provided, and to provide a specified notice within 10 days of the Governor certifying the project. The act is repealed by its own term on January 1, 2034. This bill would extend the application of the act to water storage projects, water conveyance projects, and groundwater recharge projects that provide public benefits and drought preparedness. Because a lead agency would be required to prepare the record of proceedings for water storage projects, water conveyance projects, and groundwater recharge projects pursuant to the act, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The bill would require the office to develop guidelines to implement the program that establish the criteria by which grant applications will be evaluated and funded. The bill would make these provisions operative on January 1, 2030.

Summary: The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024, approved by the voters as Proposition 4 at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election, authorized the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and outdoor access, and clean air programs. The act makes \$135,000,000 available, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to the Office of Emergency Services for a wildfire mitigation grant program to provide, among other things, loans, direct assistance, and matching funds for projects that prevent wildfires, increase resilience, maintain existing wildfire risk reduction projects, reduce the risk of wildfires to communities, or increase home or community hardening. The act provides that eligible projects include, but are not limited to, grants to local agencies, state agencies, joint powers authorities, tribes, resource conservation districts, fire safe councils, and nonprofit organizations for structure hardening of critical community infrastructure, wildfire smoke mitigation, evacuation centers, including community clean air centers, structure hardening projects that reduce the risk of wildfire for entire neighborhoods and communities, water delivery system improvements for fire suppression purposes for communities in very high or high fire hazard areas, wildfire buffers, and incentives to remove structures that significantly increase hazard risk. This bill would include in the list of eligible projects grants to the above-mentioned entities for improvements to public evacuation routes in very high and high fire hazard severity zones, mobile rigid dip tanks, as defined, to support firefighting efforts, prepositioned mobile rigid water storage, as defined, and improvements to the response and effectiveness of fire engines and helicopters. The bill would also include grants, in coordination with the Public Utilities Commission, to local agencies, state agencies, special districts, joint powers authorities, tribes, and nonprofit organizations for backup electrical generators for water reservoirs.

The bill would also require the department to establish, and publish on the department's internet website, the specific criteria that it will employ to determine when its updated water supply forecasting model has demonstrated sufficient predictive capability to be ready for use in each of the watersheds. The bill would require the department, on or before January 1, 2028, and annually thereafter, to prepare and submit to the Legislature a report on its progress toward implementing the new forecasting model and to post the report on the department's internet website. The bill would also require the department, on or before January 1, 2028, and annually thereafter, to prepare and submit to the Legislature a report that explains the rationale for the department's operating procedures specific to the previous water year. This bill contains other related provisions.

The act repeals these provisions on January 1, 2026. This bill would delete the January 1, 2026 repeal date, thereby authorizing the above-described additional, alternative set of teleconferencing provisions indefinitely. This bill would require an air district without a specified rule on emergency backup generators, as defined, as of January 1, 2026, that adopts such a rule to include in the rule provisions that allow the operator of a critical facility, as defined, to use a permitted emergency backup generator in exceedance of the applicable runtime and testing and maintenance limits if specified conditions are met. The bill would require a critical facility allowed to exceed applicable limits under a rule adopted pursuant to that provision to attest to and provide evidence of having taken demonstrable steps toward implementing the use of backup power technologies that meet or exceed emission standards set by the state board. By adding to the duties of air districts, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws.

Orange County Consolidation Study

In like a lion, out like a lamb . . .

When the Orange County Grand Jury released its “Water in Orange County needs one voice” report in June 2022, it unleashed a torrent of controversy. In October 2022, the Orange County Water District submitted an application to Orange County LAFCO to prepare a comprehensive Municipal Service Review and Sphere of Influence update. They also requested a feasibility analysis of the potential consolidation of OCWD and MWDOC.

For over two years, Orange County’s waterworld anxiously awaited the results. In the meantime, there was significant posturing by both of Orange County’s two major water agencies.

After all the waiting, things concluded with a whimper at the March OCLAFCO meeting. When only three cards were submitted for public comment, it was apparent the water war had been called off.

The first of the three public comments speeches, MWDOC Director Al Nederhood brought up shortcomings of the consolidation study conducted by Albert Webb and Associates and argued that the Commission should merely receive and file the study. This year’s OCWD Chair Denis Bilodeau remarked that this process had been a good exercise and the study could serve as a great starting point in the future. Finally, MWDOC General Manager Harvey La Torre made the point that proceeding with consolidation would be an extremely complicated process.

Both the Webb and Associates Project Manager and the merger consultant John Schutz gave brief testimony due to the admonishment from LAFCO Chair Don Wagner. In his comments, Schutz seemed to walk back some of his rosier consolidation comments by noting that going to Sacramento for a legislative solution would be problematic.

After over two years of controversy, the Commission voted unanimously to receive and file.

In Other



The March meeting also featured adoption of the Agency’s proposed annual budget. The adopted budget for the 2025/2026 fiscal years totals \$1.837 million dollars. The largest expenditure is comprised of staff salaries. The lion’s share of revenues \$1.692

million dollars will come from year's apportionments. The overall increases from this year's apportionments is 7%. The total received from special districts is \$526,779.

New PPIC Statewide Survey

The Public Policy Institute of California recently released the results of its latest Californians and Their Government statewide survey. The survey of 1,589 California adults was conducted February 4-11, 2025. A survey of this size has a margin of error +/- 3.2% with a 95% confidence level.

Response to this survey tilts slightly more conservative when filtered for “likely voters”. Here are the questions and responses from Californian adults in some of the survey’s key questions:

Which one issue facing California today do you think is the most important for the governor and state legislature to work on in 2025?

- 24% cost of living, economy, inflation, jobs
- 14% housing costs, availability
- 13% environment, fires, water
- 10% homelessness
- 10% immigration, illegal immigration
- 9% government in general, problems with elected officials, political parties
- 5% state budget, deficit, taxes
- 4% crime, gangs, drugs
- 11% other
- 1% don't know

Overall, do you approve or disapprove of the way that Governor Newsom is handling his job as governor of California?

- 52% approve
- 47% disapprove
- 1% don't know

Turning to economic conditions in California, do you think that during the next 12 months we will have good times financially or bad times?

- 30% good times
- 69% bad times
- 1% don't know

Do you think the state budget situation in California—that is, the balance between government spending and revenues—is a big problem, somewhat of a problem, or not a problem for the people of California today?

- 38% big problem
- 53% somewhat of a problem
- 7% not a problem
- 2% don't know

In general, which of the following statements do you agree with more: I'd rather pay higher taxes and have a state government that provides more services, OR I'd rather pay lower taxes and have a state government that provides fewer services?

Governor Newsom recently proposed a budget plan for the next fiscal year that includes \$228.9 billion in general fund spending and \$363 million surplus. The governor's proposal—which also revises the existing budget—includes strengthening climate resiliency, increasing higher education and K–12 resources, fully funding transitional kindergarten, and expanding health and human services. Despite \$16.5 billion more in revenue than projected in last year's budget, the plan pulls \$7.1 billion from the state's reserves. In general, do you favor or oppose the governor's budget plan?

- 58% favor
- 39% oppose
- 1% haven't heard anything about the budget (volunteered)
- 2% don't know

Governor Newsom has proposed to use \$7.1 billion from the Budget Stabilization Account or "Rainy Day Fund," one of the state's reserves, to partially balance the current budget. This is part of a two-year plan proposed in 2024. This means less funding will be available to backfill spending if revenues start to decrease. Board of Supervisors March 11th Meeting

The March 11, 2025 meeting of the OC Board was a lengthy affair, lasting nearly eight hours. There were three issues that consumed much of the time.

First, the Board continued to restructure the County's treasury operation. The Board voted unanimously to dissolve the Treasury Oversight Committee and instead establish a new Audit Oversight Committee. As part of the Board's ongoing assault on Orange County elected Treasurer, they voted to allow her to serve as a non-voting member of this new committee.

Secondly, at the behest of Supervisors Nguyen and Sarmiento, the Board voted to begin the process of revamping the Orange County Animal Care program. High on the list of proposed changes for the animal shelter include lengthening the hours of operation, a greater emphasis on public visitation and pet adoption and a greater emphasis on transparency, posting animal statistics monthly on the agency's website.

Finally, the Board discussed the County's response to the Orange County Grand Jury's report "Is voting integrity alive and well in Orange County?"

The Grand Jury made three key findings in their report. First, "there was no evidence of fraud or election interference ascertained in the 2024 general election in Orange County". Secondly, "voting in Orange County is fair, secure and transparent". Lastly, the ROV communications and outreach programs promotes transparency and public confidence in the voting process. Orange County eligible voters can feel secure in knowing that the ROV provided an election of the highest recognized standards". About 15 public speakers called the report into question, stating various data points of the total number of voters didn't mesh. They also contend that the process of sending all voters absentee ballots lends itself to fraud. The Board of Supervisors ended up voting 4-1 to concur with the Grand Jury's findings with only Supervisor Nguyen dissenting.



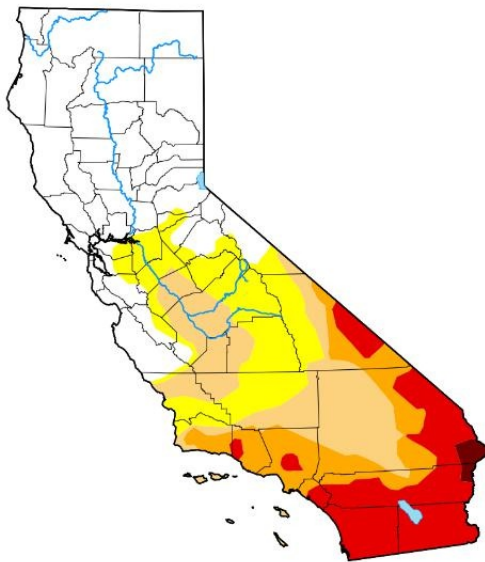
Hopefully Last Week's Rains Will Bring Improvement to this Chart
